ADMINISTRATIVE RULE CHANGE

Effective July 1, 2018, the Bureau of Emergency Medical Services and Preparedness (BESMP) EMS personnel license process will change. The BEMSP is rewriting the recertification protocols and will make them available on the EMS website prior to July 1. Additional guidance will also be available on the website to assist in renewing your license.

The changes include the <u>two-year license for all EMS personnel and</u> also reduce the amount of Continuing Medical Education (CME) required. The new administrative rules also go into effect July 1 and will <u>require you to maintain your NREMT certification</u>.

If you were certified by the NREMT after July 1, 2015, you will need a current NREMT certification in order to renew your license. The NREMT may have your status listed as inactive. If you are listed as inactive, CME verification will be required by your training officer, or if you are unaffiliated the BEMSP will be able to assist you in changing your status to active.

We understand there may be some confusion about these new requirements. If you are affiliated with an agency, your training officer should be able to explain them. If you are unaffiliated, we recommend you contact the course coordinator where you received your initial training, for guidance. In addition, you may call the bureau at (801) 273-6666 for assistance.

National Continued Competency Program (NCCP)

The National Continued Competency Program (NCCP) is the new standard that will be used in renewing your license as an EMS provider. The number of hours required to renew your license is dependent upon your level of certification.

In addition to the NCCP requirements the bureau requires, AEMTs are required to have either Pediatric Education for Prehospital Professionals (PEPP), Pediatric Emergency Assessment, Recognition and Stabilization (PEARS), or an equivalent as determined by the UBEMSP. Paramedics are still required to have Advanced Cardiac Life Support (ACLS) and Pediatric Education for Prehospital Professionals (PEPP), or Pediatric Advanced Life Support (PALS).

Effective July 1, 2018 the specific requirements to renew your license will be published under the Personnel Resources tab on the bureau's webpage.

Emergency Medical Services (EMS) is the first line of stroke defense

Enhancing EMS stroke recognition and adequate prehospital care lowers mortality and reduces long-term disability^{1,2}

A stroke occurs every 40 seconds in the United States, affecting an estimated 795,000 people annually.³

As an EMS professional, your role is critical in optimizing stroke care to help to lower mortality and long-term disability associated with stroke:

- Ensure you know your region's routing protocols and the stroke capabilities of hospitals in your area
- Request performance metrics from EMS data capture to review and identify areas of improvement
- Spread awareness by educating the community in recognizing the signs of stroke and learning how to take action. (Calling 911 and using EMS helps provide optimal prehospital stroke care.)

Children's Health Information Red Pack (CHIRP)

EMSC has worked with many of our partners to create a registry for children with complicated healthcare needs. This is the Children's Health Information Red Pack (CHIRP) Program.

Purpose: to provide a way of giving key emergency health information to EMS responding to a call on a child with special healthcare needs (CSHCN) in order to improve the care of these children.

Parents of CSHCN: Once enrolled, a parent can easily update their child's changing medical needs, medications, and recommendations online. Knowing that their child has up-to-date information available to anyone caring for their child can give them peace of mind.

EMS: It satisfies the HIPPA requirements to allow you (the EMS provider) access to medical information on a particular child in your service area, a child that you will likely have to respond to. It also promotes easy access to current key information when you get that call.

GLOBUS RELIEF

There are resources available to help nonprofit organizations reduce their operating and training costs. Globus Relief is a nonprofit organization that provides medical supplies to assist in disasters that occur around the world. To support their shipping costs and other expenses they sell medical supplies at roughly 85% off the retail price to nonprofit EMS agencies. For example, IV catheters are less than \$2 each. A brand-new suction unit costs less than \$50. Boxes of gloves sell for \$1.50 per box. A pair of EMT scissors is only \$1.20. Items are sold on a first come, first served basis and is limited to what items they have in stock. TRAINING OFFICERS

COURSE COORDINATORS

It is critical that course coordinators understand the certification and recertification requirements. It is your responsibility to ensure that your students know their responsibilities and understand the need to keep their National Registry of Emergency Medical Technicians certification current. It is no longer optional to maintain the NREMT certification.

The bureau has designated the specific remedial training requirements for those who fail the cognitive test three times. Documentation that the student has completed the required remedial training is required prior to the student being allowed three additional cognitive tests.

Please use the Utah Bureau of Emergency Medical Services and Preparedness Licensing & Certification System to sign up for instructor, training officer, and course coordinator courses, as well as initial certifications and recertification. It will take you to the course details and enable you to register. You will have to start an application for each certification - choose "initial" or "renew" and the fees can be paid online.


