
JOHN NALBANDIAN

When Harry Wayne Casey started working in the music business he was performing menial tasks around the T.K. Records/Studio complex in his hometown of Miami. He began writing songs with bassist Richard Finch soon the Band was born! KC (short for Casey) and the Sunshine Band's first record made the top 15 on the R&B chart. Their second album, released in 1975, went triple platinum and contained the #1 hits *Get Down Tonight*, *That's the Way (I Like It)*, *Boogie Shoes*, and *Rock Your Baby*.

KC & The Sunshine Band became the first act to score four #1 pop singles in one 12-month period. KC's third album, PART 3, also went triple platinum and contained the #1 singles *I'm Your Boogie Man*, *Shake Your Booty*, and *Keep It Comin' Love*. The band's string of hit singles continued with *Boogie Shoes*, which was included on the Saturday Night Fever soundtrack and *Please Don't Go*.

With sales of over 100 million records, nine Grammy nominations, three Grammy Awards and an American Music Award, KC and The Sunshine Band is credited with changing the sound of modern pop music!

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

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
