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3 JAY DEE DOWNS: Welcome.

4 Who's on the phone? Randy?

5 GAY BROGDON: Yeah.

6 JAY DEE DOWNS: Randy, are you on the

7 phone?

8 RANDY WILDEN: I am here.

9 JAY DEE DOWNS: Let's go ahead and get

10 started. Anybody else that's on the line? I don't

11 think so.

12 We don't have to have a quorum where this

13 is just a task force, right?

14 GUY DANSIE: Right, right.

15 But, yeah, that's -- if you want to vote

16 on something, we don't have a quorum. But I guess we

17 can make a recommendation.

18 JAY DEE DOWNS: Make a recommendation to

19 the committee.

20 GUY DANSIE: And Darren Park, he's not on

21 the agenda, but he had some last minute

22 cross-references and things that's under the

23 department side of the rule. So we were going to put

24 those in and have you guys, as a courtesy, look at it

25 make sure you guys are good with it and understand

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1 it. He ran off.

2 It's not on the agenda though, so I was

3 going to say to work on the agenda.

4 JAY DEE DOWNS: Go ahead.

5 GUY DANSIE: The biggest single thing that

6 we're doing with the rules right now is changing the

7 certification language to licensure for people.

8 Because that's how the statute is now. And these are

9 the other pieces. We sent those out last -- was it

10 June? The end of June, we sent out the other

11 documents. We decided that most people weren't

12 available. So we said "Just look at those. Are they

13 okay?" They were approved by the EMS committee to

14 make those changes of certification to licensure.

15 And I have the other pieces of the rule

16 that we're going to go through today, and then we'll

17 try to make them all effective at the same time.

18 And Regina will recognize in here there

19 are some other changes that have been made to this

20 draft that were approved in our spring meeting, the

21 dispatch language.

22 REGINA NELSON: Uh-huh (affirmative).

23 GUY DANSIE: So as we go down through --

24 REGINA NELSON: Okay.

25 LAUARA SNYDER: I have a question first.

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1 Dave handed out this thing. It gave us a synopsis of

2 the minutes of the January meeting, I guess.

3 GUY DANSIE: Do you want to approve them,

4 or do you have --

5 LAUARA SNYDER: In the very last -- the

6 second page, in the very last paragraph where it

7 talks about -- let's see. Oh, no, that was that.

8 Wait a minute.

9 Oh, on the first page, it's the paragraph

10 right before the last one, it says -- the last

11 recommendation where it states, "The committee

12 adopts..." The word "committee" should probably be

13 changed to "Bureau."

14 GUY DANSIE: Okay.

15 LAUARA SNYDER: So my question on that is

16 then why have a committee? Because I understand that

17 right now the committee really has no lawmaking power

18 because of the last legislation in January, I think

19 it was. Really they don't. They used to. Because

20 it was like a two-handed thing. But now they don't.

21 The committee is there; they can review

22 things and make recommendations. But the Bureau is

23 the one that makes the decisions. They took all the

24 decision-making away from committees with that

25 legislative --

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1 GUY DANSIE: Yeah. I know what you're
2 talking about. But I don't think that's what this is
3 referring to. I think this is just in the rule it's
4 talking about --
5 LAUARA SNYDER: It says the committee
6 adopts something, right?
7 GUY DANSIE: I'll have to look at the
8 reference. Do you want to look at it? I have that
9 document.
10 LAUARA SNYDER: If anything you could say
11 the committee, you know, likes it, agrees to it.
12 JAY DEE DOWNS: Makes a recommendation.
13 LAUARA SNYDER: Makes a recommendation
14 about it. But you don't want to change "committee"
15 to "Bureau" unless you really don't want to have a
16 committee.
17 GUY DANSIE: No. The committee is very
18 important. I think that there were some disputes
19 when there were issues with the committee and the
20 department, but...
21 GAY BROGDON: Number two, that is showing
22 the committee adopts.
23 GUY DANSIE: The committee adopts?
24 GAY BROGDON: That's what she's talking
25 about.

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1 GUY DANSIE: "The United States Department
2 of Transportation EMS instructive program have the
3 standard for the EMS instructor training and
4 competency..."
5 LAUARA SNYDER: Okay. So in that context
6 it is the Bureau that adopts it.
7 GUY DANSIE: Yeah.
8 LAUARA SNYDER: But you wouldn't know that
9 by looking at this. It just is --
10 GUY DANSIE: Okay. Do we need to amend
11 the minutes then? The minutes --
12 LAUARA SNYDER: No, no. It does say it.
13 It does. I just didn't have it referenced. So
14 that's right, that probably is the "Bureau."
15 GUY DANSIE: I'd almost argue for
16 department. That's how we referred to it.
17 LAUARA SNYDER: That's how we've referred
18 to it in all of our other stuff.
19 GUY DANSIE: I'm going to put
20 "department."
21 LAUARA SNYDER: Executive decision time.
22 Go ahead.
23 GUY DANSIE: Well, are you guys okay with
24 that? I made your point for you, didn't I? Because
25 the --

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1 JAY DEE DOWNS: Take that.
2 GUY DANSIE: Is that change okay, or do
3 you not like it? Honestly, I don't care.
4 "Department of Transportation's EMS instructor
5 training," that's what. Because the state -- the
6 department does the instructor training, right?
7 JAY DEE DOWNS: Uh-huh (affirmative).
8 GUY DANSIE: Are you guys good with that?
9 Everyone is nodding.
10 Lauara is not mad at me?
11 LAUARA SNYDER: I wasn't mad at you
12 before.
13 JAY DEE DOWNS: You've made an executive
14 decision. We'll go by it.
15 GUY DANSIE: Okay. I'll save it. Let's
16 go back to this 426-2.
17 GAY BROGDON: Do you want to consider
18 this?
19 GUY DANSIE: Yeah, yeah. Okay. So we did
20 that change. Is there anything else in the minutes
21 we want to do?
22 LAUARA SNYDER: Oh, I did have a -- one
23 other thing.
24 GUY DANSIE: Sure.
25 LAUARA SNYDER: And I wasn't there to -- -

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1 I don't know. Maybe I was there. I don't remember.
2 It was a long time ago. It's talking about the Utah
3 four-year certification, and we briefly talked about
4 this before the meeting started. And I don't know,
5 but it seems like we have to be -- I would think we
6 need to be careful about saying, well, you're an EMT
7 but we're going to handle your certification
8 different than -- if you are working for a licensed
9 agency versus you are an EMT licensed by the State.
10 And we're going to handle your certification
11 differently if you don't work for a licensed agency.
12 Is that what this says?
13 GUY DANSIE: Yeah. And I think there's
14 been an attempt to un -- it probably has unaffiliated
15 EMTs.
16 GAY BROGDON: And National Registry
17 doesn't accept them at active.
18 LAUARA SNYDER: And I don't like that.
19 GAY BROGDON: But we're trying to get that
20 worked out to where there's an independent board that
21 they're kind of affiliated with, kind of an
22 independent agency. It's not really an agency but a
23 house stamp is my understanding.
24 GUY DANSIE: Yeah.
25 LAUARA SNYDER: But, see, if you're an

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1 independent EMT, they can do a lot of different
2 things.
3 GUY DANSIE: Right.
4 LAUARA SNYDER: I know life insurance
5 companies use a lot of parameds/EMTs to go out and do
6 this. But it's like, oh, your licensure isn't under
7 current -- you know, you're inactive, or whatever it
8 said. That's not right. They've gone through the
9 same training and maintain the same training.
10 GUY DANSIE: Right. I think the big issue
11 was medical direction and making sure --
12 LAUARA SNYDER: We have state medical
13 protocols now.
14 GUY DANSIE: Right. Dr. Talliac has
15 agreed -- this is in the last few weeks -- has agreed
16 to be the medical director for those people and have
17 them -- so that we can have them go through some kind
18 of medical direction.
19 LAUARA SNYDER: That could be a nightmare.
20 GUY DANSIE: I know. I know. I agree.
21 JAY DEE DOWNS: So what you're saying --
22 GUY DANSIE: It's a tough one to crack.
23 JAY DEE DOWNS: Let me get it straight in
24 my head. So what we're saying here is you've got the
25 people who are licensed or certified who are working

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1 for agencies, public or private agencies, ambulance
2 agencies, first responders, or whatever, and those
3 people are considered to be active.
4 GAY BROGDON: With National Registry.
5 JAY DEE DOWNS: With National Registry.
6 So now you have people who go through the
7 EMT class and finish the class and now they're
8 considered still certified or licensed by the State?
9 GUY DANSIE: They get the card.
10 Everything is good with them. But they don't have a
11 job with -- like with the ambulance or quick
12 response.
13 JAY DEE DOWNS: But they're considered
14 inactive with --
15 GAY BROGDON: National Registry.
16 JAY DEE DOWNS: -- National Registry.
17 So what's this saying here? That the
18 State will do the same thing, recognize them as
19 inactive?
20 GUY DANSIE: And that's what we're trying
21 to do, trying to find a way to keep them active.
22 GAY BROGDON: So that they are considered
23 active.
24 GUY DANSIE: Considered active.
25 JAY DEE DOWNS: Right. I think it's a

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1 schematic on words. Because if they're licensed,
2 they're licensed. And it doesn't matter if they're
3 working for an agency or not.
4 LAUARA SNYDER: Except for if they're
5 going -- somewhere in here if it says they're
6 inactive and I go to get a job, it's like, "Oh, wait,
7 we've checked and you're inactive."
8 JAY DEE DOWNS: That's my point, why do we
9 have to have a State licensure active or inactive?
10 LAUARA SNYDER: Exactly.
11 GUY DANSIE: Our license card that --
12 GAY BROGDON: We don't say they're
13 inactive. National Registry does.
14 JAY DEE DOWNS: That's the thing that
15 National Registry does. That's National Registry.
16 But if your state license says you're active, then
17 why --
18 GUY DANSIE: Then you're fine as long as
19 you met the National Registry requirements up front.
20 JAY DEE DOWNS: Yeah. Why do we even need
21 to take an attempt to even look at that?
22 LAUARA SNYDER: I agree. It would be a
23 nightmare. Because in that same scenario I was
24 discussing, you'd have, you know, someone looking to
25 hire some people and they're looking at these

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1 resumes. And here's an EMT that's inactive, and
2 here's one that's active. Everything else being
3 equal, which one are you going to hire?
4 GUY DANSIE: Right.
5 LAUARA SNYDER: And that's not a good
6 thing.
7 GUY DANSIE: Right.
8 JAY DEE DOWNS: I also look at them and
9 go, okay, isn't it true that if you're an advanced
10 EMT and paramedic and really can only really act as
11 an advanced EMT and paramedic if you have a medical
12 control?
13 GUY DANSIE: Right.
14 JAY DEE DOWNS: Yeah. So technically if
15 I'm a paramedic and I'm not working for an agency,
16 okay -- because technically a paramedic who's driving
17 down the highway, he's out of his jurisdiction --
18 GUY DANSIE: Yeah.
19 JAY DEE DOWNS: -- he's technically just
20 an EMT.
21 LAUARA SNYDER: Right.
22 JAY DEE DOWN: Is that correct?
23 LAUARA SNYDER: First responder, yeah, lay
24 person.
25 GUY DANSIE: Yeah, yeah.

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1 JAY DEE DOWNS: So then when you go with
2 that level, you're say the EMT has certain levels and
3 skills. They really can't even administer drugs
4 without an online medical control direction.
5 GUY DANSIE: Right.
6 JAY DEE DOWNS: So now I'm kind of going,
7 "Well, why do they even need to have a medical
8 control"?

9 LAUARA SNYDER: I don't think they need to
10 have a medical control. I think so long as we have
11 medical protocols that are State protocols then --
12 GUY DANSIE: Default to those.
13 LAUARA SNYDER: Right.
14 JAY DEE DOWNS: The problem with the State
15 protocols though is they're not adopted by the State;
16 they're recommended.
17 LAUARA SNYDER: Yeah. But it's better
18 than no protocols for people who are --
19 JAY DEE DOWNS: But when you're in that
20 circumstance, then you fall back to the EMT national
21 training that you have.
22 LAUARA SNYDER: There you go. Well,
23 that's true. That's the standard you would behold
24 to.
25 JAY DEE DOWNS: Yeah.

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1 LAUARA SNYDER: And that's where this all
2 would come in is if somebody sues somebody.
3 It's like, "Well, you did this."
4 "Well, that was under National."
5 And that's probably where we better hold
6 it. Because if you start going out of, well, now,
7 these are our State protocols, you're going to have
8 to defend those.
9 But the National Registry's core scope of
10 practice, whatever it is that we're taught --
11 JAY DEE DOWNS: Curriculum.
12 LAUARA SNYDER: -- that's defendable.
13 JAY DEE DOWNS: Curriculum, yeah.
14 So if I'm a paramedic and I'm coming down
15 the highway and happen upon a traffic accident, I
16 stay within the basic level of a basic EMT. Then
17 my -- even though I'm a paramedic, I'll be judged
18 against another person at EMT level. Now, I
19 certainly will have a lot more knowledge and stuff
20 as long as I keep my skills in check, I don't start
21 doing Price and stuff like that, then I should be
22 okay.
23 GUY DANSIE: Right.
24 JAY DEE DOWNS: As soon as I step out of
25 that and I start doing -- now, if I have drugs in my

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1 little pouch and I start administering drugs, now I'm
2 out of bounds. I'm out of bounds even if I'm an EMT
3 doing that.
4 GUY DANSIE: Right, right.
5 JAY DEE DOWNS: I don't know. That's just
6 my train of thought, and maybe I'm wrong. But --
7 LAUARA SNYDER: I think sometimes we try
8 to overregulate, and we make more problems than we
9 need. So I don't know that we really need medical
10 directors for direction to make all of the EMTs or
11 EMS people who aren't working for a licensed or
12 designated agency. I don't know that we --
13 GAY BROGDON: These are people that want
14 to renew their National Registry because they want to
15 be associated --
16 LAUARA SNYDER: So then National Registry
17 says you have to be associated?
18 GAY BROGDON: You have to be active.
19 LAUARA SNYDER: So another reason I don't
20 like National Registry.
21 JAY DEE DOWNS: Do you know what, that's
22 not -- to be honest with you, I think I ought to go
23 back and look at your stats and say, "Okay, if you
24 have 100 EMT students that are certified that year,
25 how many of them actually are staying certified that

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1 aren't affiliated with an agency? It's pretty
2 doggone tough to stay certified.
3 GUY DANSIE: Right.
4 JAY DEE DOWNS: Because you're just --
5 unless you're --
6 GUY DANSIE: For your training.
7 JAY DEE DOWNS: It's pretty doggone tough.
8 So I think you go back to that and say, "Okay, out of
9 all of the EMTs that are not affiliated, how many of
10 them actually go back and re-certify?"
11 Now, I'm kind of going back -- well, it
12 kind of goes back to the way the law enforcement is.
13 Those guys will go through POST. And if though don't
14 get picked up from an agency, if I'm correct, they
15 can lose their POST certification. They're not
16 certified until they're picked up by POST.
17 REGINA NELSON: Right.
18 JAY DEE DOWNS: And fire is kind of like
19 the same way. If you go through the Fire 1 class --
20 and correct me if I'm wrong, Randy. But if you go
21 through the Fire 1 class and if you don't get picked
22 up by an agency and recommended by an agency, then
23 you don't get certified. Is that correct?
24 RANDY WILDEN: You can be certified
25 unaffiliated.

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1 JAY DEE DOWNS: There you go.
2 RANDY WILDEN: But it is a constant
3 battle. I think you see the same thing in the fire
4 world that if they're not affiliated, they are unable
5 to maintain their training and certification lapses.
6 I'd say a high percentage of them lapse.
7 LAUARA SNYDER: I think the difference
8 with fire, comparing fire though to EMS, is when
9 you're doing training for a fire department, you need
10 those hoses and trucks and stuff.
11 If you're doing re-cert training for EMT,
12 you can go to a conference or you can go to online
13 training. You don't have to have a fire truck and
14 hoses and all of that other equipment to do that.
15 RANDY WILDEN: Well, you can -- I mean,
16 their same options are available. All of the
17 colleges offer them. All the technical schools offer
18 them.
19 LAUARA SNYDER: I'm just saying it's
20 easier if you're not a fireman in -- I don't know
21 that it's apples to apples, fire people to EMS
22 people.
23 RANDY WILDEN: I'm not sure it's apples,
24 But I'm just --
25 LAUARA SNYDER: Oranges. Apples to

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1 oranges.
2 RANDY WILDEN: -- looking at who allow
3 their fire to lapse, I'll bet you see a very, very
4 high number of fire and EMT's who lapse if they're not
5 affiliated either as a volunteer part-time or
6 full-time.
7 JAY DEE DOWNS: Now, a paramedic might do
8 more because they went to school and got that, and
9 there was a lot of hours and a lot of time invested.
10 But I still bet it's awfully tough to stay as a
11 paramedic if you're not affiliated with a hospital
12 or --
13 GUY DANSIE: Right.
14 JAY DEE DOWNS: I mean it's just tough.
15 Because even though you get your training on your
16 own, okay, now I've got to pay for myself to go to a
17 conference. The hardest part, too, is they start
18 hunting for training officers to sign off their stuff
19 and sign off their skills. That's the tough part.
20 Because a normal training officer out there who's
21 affiliated with an agency is saying, "Wait a minute,
22 I don't know you. You say you've got all of these
23 hours. I'm not signing off on them because I don't
24 know."
25 Unless they come down here and do it down

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1 here and one of you guys do it.
2 LAUARA SNYDER: That is how it was handled
3 for a while. You guys were doing State-organized
4 training -- or testing, State testing things, and
5 people would go and get that. And then as far as
6 their other hours they had to have certification
7 things, like online things or a certificate or
8 attendance records at a conference or something. So
9 I mean that all worked.
10 But I agree, if they're not with an
11 agency, they most likely -- you know, they're not
12 going to stay licensed as long.
13 JAY DEE DOWNS: Yeah. Now, all that being
14 said, to me, I go back to: I think we leave ours
15 alone. And if they get active with the National
16 Registry, so what.
17 LAUARA SNYDER: Well, what does it take to
18 become active with them?
19 JAY DEE DOWNS: Be affiliated with an
20 agency.
21 LAUARA SNYDER: Yeah. And I don't like
22 that. Then they have to go work for a licensed
23 agency. And say I'm just out doing life insurance
24 exams and that's all I ever want to do, but now I
25 can't renew my EMT with National Registry.

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1 JAY DEE DOWNS: How are they renewing
2 their EMT before? With an agency, got hooked up and
3 got certified?
4 LAUARA SNYDER: Yep. Well, no, Not with
5 an agency. Just through the State's testing and
6 got --
7 JAY DEE DOWNS: Let me ask you this
8 then -- you have a point there. So what if there was
9 a way the State could recognize them under their
10 agency?
11 GUY DANSIE: The State?
12 GAY BROGDON: That's what I'm talking
13 about that, forming something they could be
14 affiliated with.
15 JAY DEE DOWNS: They just come under the
16 State. The State certifies them; the State tests
17 them. You sign off on them. You're picking up the
18 stragglers. Then if that's the case, Dr. Talliac
19 would be their medical control. So that's a 360.
20 LAUARA SNYDER: Except when you're with an
21 agency, you said it exactly right, your training
22 officer is the one who has to sign off on all of
23 that. You have these 300 people who come in. Is
24 Dr. Talliac going to want to sign off that these
25 people know their skills and they've done all of the

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1 training they have on the piece of paper written?
2 You have to have that. I mean, that's the second
3 part of what you're saying. And I --
4 REGINA NELSON: I wouldn't want that job.
5 I track 15 of us, and I'm not able to keep up with
6 all of the hours.
7 GUY DANSIE: This is all in our 426-5. Do
8 we want to go back and revisit all of that?
9 JAY DEE DOWNS: I kind of agree with Gay.
10 If they're not affiliated with the agency and as a
11 State you want these people to be to be considered
12 active with the National Registry, okay -- no
13 offense, the State created this problem; the State
14 needs to solve it.
15 GAY BROGDON: My comment, too, is that my
16 understanding is that the State is not requiring
17 everybody to keep up their National Registry. That's
18 how they test to get in National Registry. But I
19 have not heard, and I may be wrong, but they're not
20 requiring you to keep it up. What they're talking
21 about is using that NCCP model to re-certify. So I
22 don't think it's necessary that you have to get your
23 National Registry; you just have to have those
24 qualifications done. Am I right?
25 GUY DANSIE: Yes.

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1 JAY DEE DOWNS: So if that's the case, why
2 do I care if the National Registry considers me
3 active or inactive?
4 GUY DANSIE: You don't.
5 GUY BROGDEN: You don't.
6 JAY DEE DOWNS: So if I care that much
7 then --
8 GAY BROGDON: Go get National Registry and
9 get affiliated. If you don't care, then it doesn't
10 matter. My understanding is the State does not
11 require that to kept up.
12 JAY DEE DOWNS: So then the insurance
13 person, they're still considered an EMT by the State
14 of Utah. It's just what they've got looked up on the
15 National Registry because they go to Nevada, they're
16 going to be looked at as an inactive person. So then
17 you say, "Well, here's my active card from the State
18 of Utah." I don't know.
19 So the question comes back if that's the
20 case then -- if that's the case, then I don't think
21 we need to address that in our rules.
22 GUY DANSIE: Do you want to look at that
23 piece of the rule? That wasn't one of the things we
24 were talking about today.
25 LAUARA SNYDER: No. We've got to get back

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1 to this thing.
2 Okay. So this whole four-year, I'm one of
3 those people. And I'm never going to --
4 GUY DANSIE: I stirred the hornet's nest.
5 LAUARA SNYDER: Yeah. And I'm never going
6 to take the National Registry.
7 GAY BROGDON: As far as I'm concerned,
8 don't lapse.
9 LAUARA SNYDER: I'm just saying --
10 GUY DANSIE: We grandfather everybody and
11 then it's lost.
12 LAUARA SNYDER: I understand. So now I'm
13 going to do it every two years instead of every four
14 years, even though I'm not with the National
15 Registry.
16 GAY BROGDON: I would assume so.
17 GUY DANSIE: Yeah. Your CME would be on a
18 two-year cycle instead of a four-year cycle.
19 LAUARA SNYDER: Well, not just the CME
20 cycle. It's the re-certification. It's the whole
21 thing. And for us it's fingerprints --
22 GAY BROGDON: You don't have to do
23 fingerprints.
24 LAUARA SNYDER: We're in Nevada.
25 GAY BROGDON: Oh.

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1 LAUARA SNYDER: It comes across good.
2 JAY DEE DOWNS: To me I don't have a
3 heartburn either way. I remember when we used to do
4 it two years, and I remember when we used to do it
5 four years. To be honest with you, I kind of like
6 the two years better because now I don't have people
7 coming in after that four years and they're on their
8 fourth year and they're going, "I haven't got any of
9 my hours done. I've got to do this. I've got to do
10 this."
11 As a training officer or a person, you're
12 going to keep track of them because it's every two
13 years.
14 LAUARA SNYDER: Personally Nevada requires
15 us to do it every two years, so I am doing that
16 anyway. It's just that if there are other people --
17 you know, I don't want to do it just because it's
18 convenient to me.
19 JAY DEE DOWNS: I'm just saying for my
20 agency -- for my agency, I could -- I'll be honest
21 with you, I kind of like the two years better than
22 the four years just for that simple reason because
23 there are so many guys who get lost in the cracks.
24 And then the next thing you know, they're trying to
25 get all their hours in in three months.

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1 LAUARA SNYDER: So that being said --
2 JAY DEE DOWNS: With that being said --
3 real quick, Lauara. If that's the case, then how
4 good of an EMT are they really being if they're
5 trying to get their hours done in three months?
6 LAUARA SNYDER: Right. So the only
7 adjustment that needs to be made here is the price,
8 the cost to --
9 JAY DEE DOWNS: Make it the same.
10 LAUARA SNYDER: Yeah. The two-year is
11 going to cost the same as it would if it were
12 four-year. And then I don't think you're going to
13 have any --
14 JAY DEE DOWNS: Make this as less painful
15 as possible so you don't have to -- because I think
16 where you're going to have your headache is if you
17 have all the hoops you have to jump through. Once
18 they're in DAC, they shouldn't have to have
19 fingerprints.
20 GAY BROGDON: Right.
21 JAY DEE DOWNS: Now it's just a matter of
22 the application and the --
23 GUY DANSIE: And their training is in.
24 JAY DEE DOWNS: Uh-huh (affirmative),
25 that's verified by the training officer.

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1 LAUARA SNYDER: And if they're not with a
2 training officer, these renegades, they show all of
3 their certifications and classes.
4 JAY DEE DOWNS: The State has to verify
5 it. The State verifies it. They certify them. What
6 do they care? Because when they come into my agency,
7 I'm going to have to put them through the ropes
8 anyway.
9 LAUARA SNYDER: So that's why we're
10 saying -- I think we agree why create a bigger
11 headache by trying to make a little association that
12 encompasses all of these loose people -- not that
13 they're loose. That's not what I meant.
14 GAY BROGDON: You said it.
15 LAUARA SNYDER: That's fine. Loose lips,
16 clean ship. Okay.
17 Or have a medical director responsible for
18 these people.
19 GUY DANSIE: This discussion is great, and
20 we're going to have it with the EMS committee. And
21 if there's negative, we won't change it. It's just
22 we're looking at it from our side and thinking that
23 maybe there's more advantages than disadvantages.
24 Realizing it's always a balancing thing. Change is
25 never --

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1 JAY DEE DOWNS: Okay. So what are the
2 advantages from your side? I haven't really looked
3 at it from your side. I'm looking at it from mine.
4 GUY DANSIE: It's the training, keeping
5 everybody in a two-year cycle instead of four-year.
6 JAY DEE DOWNS: I'm back to the active and
7 inactive thing. What's the advantage of the EMS for
8 that?
9 GUY DANSIE: I don't care if you're active
10 or inactive. It doesn't matter to me. It matters if
11 you have your training and your background check.
12 JAY DEE DOWNS: Yep.
13 GUY DANSIE: If you're legal and your TB,
14 or whatever, if you need that.
15 JAY DEE DOWNS: See, that's what I'm
16 saying, what is --
17 GUY DANSIE: It will cost us a little more
18 to print cards and do that kind of administration
19 side of it to go to two years because we're going to
20 double our workload.
21 LAUARA SNYDER: So will that person who's
22 gone through an EMT class and they've finished their
23 certification, now they want to get licensure, they
24 really don't -- well, now they have to take the
25 National Registry test.

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1 GAY BROGDON: They have to take the
2 National Registry.
3 LAUARA SNYDER: Yeah, never mind.
4 REGINA NELSON: And just from an EMD
5 perspective, the way that we have it has been working
6 very well in the State of Utah. Because we are held
7 to every two years recertifying with the academy, and
8 that's for the majority of the agencies. I know we
9 still have maybe four agencies within the State of
10 Utah --
11 JAY DEE DOWNS: Yes, we do.
12 REGINA NELSON: -- that don't have
13 currently certified through --
14 GUY DANSIE: But you get the card from
15 them or a piece of paper.
16 REGINA NELSON: We do. We get a card
17 and --
18 GUY DANSIE: And you let us know, and then
19 we give you a card saying that we're good with you.
20 REGINA NELSON: Yes. And we appreciate
21 that --
22 JAY DEE DOWNS: You send a card into them?
23 REGINA NELSON: We do. Part of the
24 re-certification is proving that we have a current
25 CPR -- we're currently CPR certified and we have our

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1 national card. And it shows all of the dates and
2 everything on there. So we're held getting two years
3 of training in that two-year period.
4 GUY DANSIE: One thing on the dispatch
5 side is we've had these problems with the small
6 sheriff's offices that haven't complied. And this
7 would make them -- we would be on top of it quicker.
8 JAY DEE DOWNS: Oh, absolutely.
9 REGINA NELSON: Yeah. You wouldn't miss
10 them for a few years.
11 JAY DEE DOWNS: That's the problem. It's
12 kind of out of sight, out of mind. They'd pop up on
13 your radar a lot faster.
14 GUY DANSIE: We'd just hear from them, but
15 we never see them.
16 JAY DEE DOWNS: The only time we hear from
17 them is when something --
18 GUY DANSIE: -- bad happens.
19 JAY DEE DOWNS: I didn't say the bad part;
20 he did.
21 GUY DANSIE: Okay. Do we want to look at
22 the rules now that we have that?
23 JAY DEE DOWNS: We're done with the
24 meeting. We can --
25 GUY DANSIE: We'll blow through the rules.

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1 I don't know what happened to Darren, but --
2 LAUARA SNYDER: I thought everything
3 looked great except for that.
4 GUY DANSIE: 426-2-300, I started making
5 changes from certification to license. The reason I
6 have it on the screen is if we have to make changes,
7 we can hurry and make the change.
8 426-2-400.
9 JAY DEE DOWNS: How come we made the
10 change in the 300, I'm sorry?
11 GAY BROGDON: Changed it from being
12 "certified" to "licensed."
13 JAY DEE DOWNS: Okay.
14 GUY DANSIE: I think in just one place
15 too. Keep up, Jay.
16 JAY DEE DOWNS: I'm slow. I drove all the
17 way down, so I'm slow. I'm still hypnotized by the
18 road.
19 GUY DANSIE: Okay. 400.
20 REGINA NELSON: We already met on that,
21 right? It's our EM -- PSAP EMD group.
22 GUY DANSIE: This reflects the changes
23 that the PSAP group made, and I put those in here.
24 You'll see those. And those haven't been through the
25 committee yet.

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1 REGINA NELSON: Yeah.
2 GUY DANSIE: But all of that is going to
3 go in one -- one fell swoop through the committee.
4 So basically we're saying that you need to
5 be nationally -- like a national recognized system by
6 the department, be trained in that system rather than
7 just trained by somebody out in the field.
8 JAY DEE DOWNS: I think that's important.
9 GUY DANSIE: I think so. If you have a
10 system, you ought to know how to use your system.
11 JAY DEE DOWNS: Absolutely.
12 GUY DANSIE: It says the training will be
13 in your system rather than just whatever.
14 JAY DEE DOWNS: I think it's a good
15 compromise, too, putting the committee on it, Regina.
16 I think this whole thing is pretty good. Don't you,
17 Guy? Don't you think it's a good compromise?
18 GUY DANSIE: Yeah, I was very happy with
19 it. Okay. We did a lot of those changes for
20 dispatcher in the certification/licensure Rule 426-5.
21 This is just the designation rule.
22 JAY DEE DOWNS: Sure.
23 GUY DANSIE: So it just basically talks
24 about what you have to have to become designated.
25 Is there anything else in there? It says

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1 designations are four years. It says that in
2 statute. So licenses and designations are four
3 years. So I didn't mess with that. So there's only
4 a few changes. I thought that they were not
5 saying -- it didn't really have anything to do with
6 that, other than a little bit with dispatch and the
7 rest of it is just changes of certification to
8 license.
9 Is there anything, Regina, especially that
10 you see under designation of dispatch?
11 REGINA NELSON: I know our meeting was
12 quite a while ago as well.
13 GUY DANSIE: Yeah, March/April.
14 REGINA NELSON: But I don't remember any
15 other additions that we discussed than what you've
16 included.
17 GUY DANSIE: We really didn't get into the
18 designation requirements. We talked about our
19 certification or licensure on the personal level.
20 REGINA NELSON: Uh-huh (affirmative).
21 GUY DANSIE: But not on the centered
22 designation requirements.
23 JAY DEE DOWNS: You know, as I go through
24 those all the time with the agency, I don't think
25 they're that too far off. I just don't.

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1 GUY DANSIE: Okay. So you're okay with --
2 JAY DEE DOWNS: Yeah.
3 GUY DANSIE: So the substance hasn't
4 changed. It's just the terminology that I've changed
5 to match.
6 JAY DEE DOWNS: You maybe can make a few
7 changes here and there. But Regina knows this, as
8 you go through you've got to have -- I mean like,
9 what system do you use? So you're ensuring they have
10 a system. What's the backup system? How many have
11 people certified? You've got to have a medical
12 control who signs off on the cards. It kind of also
13 flows with what we require with the EMT designations
14 and licensure. So I'm not sure we want to even touch
15 that.
16 GUY DANSIE: So I left it pretty vanilla.
17 JAY DEE DOWNS: Yeah. Unless you guys
18 want to, but I --
19 REGINA NELSON: No. I thought we matched
20 this up. Maybe it was prior to our other meeting.
21 But I know this matched the application. When we go
22 in to do our center re-designation form, this
23 matches. And maybe it was when Kevin Rose was on the
24 EMS rules committee. Is he still one of our members?
25 We had already talked about just making it match, and

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1 this matches.
2 GUY DANSIE: Okay. And we can go back and
3 modify it again later and see whether we actually
4 want to --
5 JAY DEE DOWNS: I think what the
6 discussion comes in a little bit, too, is not
7 necessarily that. The form that nobody really cares
8 for is the inspection form.
9 GUY DANSIE: Right.
10 JAY DEE DOWNS: That's the one that's kind
11 of whew.
12 GUY DANSIE: Well, we can redo the form to
13 match the rule. That's what originally the intent
14 was.
15 JAY DEE DOWNS: It matched the rule, but
16 it's confusing is what it is.
17 GUY DANSIE: Well, we can re-work the
18 form.
19 JAY DEE DOWNS: Yeah. We need to. I
20 think that's where the discussion is. It's not the
21 designation, but it's the form.
22 GUY DANSIE: It's the form.
23 So are we okay with the changes?
24 JAY DEE DOWNS: I'm cool.
25 GUY DANSIE: I'll move to save it as is

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1 then.
2 We will look at 426-3. This is the
3 licensure for service that we have it for -- it's
4 kind of getting more confusing, licensure for a
5 service.
6 JAY DEE DOWNS: This is like an ambulance?
7 Okay. You're saying QRU. This is transporting,
8 right?
9 GUY DANSIE: This is transporting, and
10 it's also paramedic-level response.
11 JAY DEE DOWNS: Rescue.
12 GUY DANSIE: Because in statute it has
13 them included as a license type.
14 LAUARA SNYDER: It talks about a person
15 because that's an agency. Because legally a
16 person -- an agency is a person.
17 GUY DANSIE: Yeah. And that definition is
18 in our 426-1. You can either be an individual,
19 according to it, or an agency.
20 But we do get into one issue. This is
21 something that I've been asked by our executive
22 director's office to do. In 426-3-300, it talks
23 about licensure types. And we've added new language
24 for 3, basically mirroring the inter-facility in 4,
25 the old -- the new 4. And this is for license type

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1 for the exclusive 911-only. And this -- we've added
2 this because there are some issues in Salt Lake
3 Valley on who can do what for 911-only or
4 inter-facility. There's some ambiguity between what
5 the statute says and what our rules have said. So
6 this is a clean -- an attempt to clean that
7 misunderstanding up somewhat.
8 I've actually had Brittany review this,
9 and she was okay with it.
10 Are you guys -- as you read through it,
11 does it look all right?
12 LAUARA SNYDER: This is the one that was
13 really hotly debated before. It's like if you're
14 licensed, you're licensed for everything in your
15 area. Why do you have to have a separate license or
16 let somebody else come in and do your
17 inter-facilities and agree to have --
18 GUY DANSIE: True.
19 LAUARA SNYDER: -- an agreement with them
20 in order to do your --
21 GUY DANSIE: It's true for Wendover. It's
22 true for Cache ambulance. It's true for everybody
23 except in Salt Lake County. There are a half a
24 dozen -- I can't remember the exact amount -- of
25 services. And it talks about it in the statute.

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1 It's in Title 26-AA-416, I believe, part 6. It talks
2 about the exceptions to exclusive geographic service
3 areas, and there are two exceptions. And one of them
4 is if they have an agreement before September of
5 1999, which is the case with several of the large
6 fire services here in Salt Lake County, UFA, Murray,
7 Sandy, West Valley, West Jordan -- I'm trying to
8 think of who I'm missing. Anyway, those are the --
9 they have an agreement with Gold Cross. And their
10 original license was based on that agreement.
11 It talks about that in there. And that's
12 one of the exceptions to the exclusive geographic
13 service area, or if they have a license type that's
14 different, which is the case in -- with Draper City's
15 new license and with West Jordan who reapplied for
16 their license under that type of license. So it's
17 911-only. So those exist in statute. There's some
18 911-only licenses that exist in Salt Lake County.
19 And that's what this is an attempt to do, to describe
20 what those are going to do. And I agree
21 philosophically if we can or can't. But that's the
22 statute is, and that's the way it's been set up. And
23 historically --
24 LAUARA SNYDER: When did that -- did the
25 statute change after all of the hubbub over all of

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1 the rules and the way it was all discussed?
2 GUY DANSIE: Not that, no. We've changed
3 the statute --
4 LAUARA SNYDER: If that statute was there
5 before, then why are we even arguing about the rules?
6 GUY DANSIE: I think it's just because in
7 the statute it talks about 911-only -- or 911 calls
8 and non-911 providers, okay. And that was part of
9 the RPP. And I guess they moved that definition to
10 the general definitions.
11 However, the department, or the Bureau has
12 licensed -- typically has licensed Gold Cross as
13 inter-facility. And nowhere in the statute does it
14 talk about inter-facility. So really the big fix is
15 to change the statute so that it actually matches
16 what Gold Cross has as an inter-facility license.
17 We talked about inter-facility in the
18 rule, which is okay because the department can
19 license how it sees fit. And that's why we've had
20 this clause in the rule about inter-facility. Our
21 attempt is to put the 911-only in there so that it
22 talks about what that is and then it talks about what
23 the inter-facility is. So that those two are more
24 delineated so that we understand what the one is and
25 what the other one is.

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1 JAY DEE DOWNS: It was my understanding
2 too though if --
3 GUY DANSIE: We are possibly pursuing a
4 statute change though as a department as well.
5 JAY DEE DOWNS: We ought to take care of
6 that. It probably won't do anything.
7 But anyway, my understanding, too, though
8 was if you had whatever was part of your suite, so to
9 speak, before, so if you had advanced EMT, paramedic
10 rescue, inter-facility, then instead of having to
11 apply for license for each one of those, you only had
12 to apply for one.
13 GUY DANSIE: Right.
14 JAY DEE DOWNS: However, if you had a 911
15 license, it didn't necessarily mean that you
16 automatically picked up those other suites as well.
17 That was my understanding, but maybe I'm wrong.
18 GUY DANSIE: Well, 911-only pertains to
19 those that had service agreements with Gold Cross
20 prior to September 1999. So those are the
21 exceptions, and those are the ones that we're trying
22 to address. Everybody else is licensed to do all the
23 services.
24 (Darren Park enters the room.)
25 JAY DEE DOWNS: Hey, how are you doing?

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1 Welcome.
2 LAUARA SNYDER: So unless it's says
3 specifically "your license is for inter-facility only
4 or a 911-only," when you get your license it's for
5 everything in your area?
6 GUY DANSIE: Correct.
7 LAUARA SNYDER: Which is what we argued
8 before.
9 GUY DANSIE: Yeah. And doesn't -- it is
10 that way for everybody except for UFA and some of the
11 others that have agreements with Gold Cross.
12 LAUARA SNYDER: Yeah, I understand that --
13 GUY DANSIE: I know we've argued about it
14 for years and decades even, but that's how it is.
15 And this attempt is just to describe what that
16 911-only license does. What it means.
17 LAUARA SNYDER: Well, all of those years
18 of angst has brought about this agreement between all
19 of these places to be able to work together, and
20 that's great.
21 GUY DANSIE: Super. But sometimes their
22 minds change and they still don't want to work
23 together, and I understand that.
24 LAUARA SNYDER: Well, I don't know.
25 GUY DANSIE: But I'm bound by statute

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1 right now, and the statute quotes 26-8-A-416, and it
2 talks about those agreements and those service types.
3 And so that's what -- like I said, we
4 didn't have this piece of rule before. I was told to
5 put it in. I actually helped craft the language. It
6 references that the statute in there Title
7 26-8-A-416-6. And like I said, those are the
8 exceptions, those two fire -- large fire services in
9 Salt Lake County have agreements with Gold Cross
10 prior to September of '99.
11 It doesn't affect anybody, but it just
12 defines what their license is for and what it
13 doesn't.
14 Fur is going to hit the fan when I take it
15 to the committee. You guys probably don't have -- it
16 doesn't affect anybody in this room except for maybe
17 Darren, who just came in, but...
18 RANDY WILDEN: Guy, are those entities
19 involved with Gold Cross all good with this verbiage?
20 GUY DANSIE: I don't know, Randy. That's
21 why I put it on the table is we need to look at it
22 and have everybody either agree, disagree, or amend
23 it as needed.
24 JAY DEE DOWNS: So you were directed to
25 put this in here by your superior, so to speak?

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1 GUY DANSIE: Yeah, yeah. We've had issues
2 in Salt Lake Valley where there has been
3 misinterpretation of what their license type is for,
4 and this is an attempt to describe what their license
5 type is.
6 LAUARA SNYDER: Okay.
7 JAY DEE DOWNS: So this will go to the
8 committee, then go out to vote -- or out to comment
9 and all of that?
10 GUY DANSIE: Uh-huh (affirmative). Do we
11 want to change it?
12 RANDY WILDEN: Good work.
13 JAY DEE DOWNS: What's that?
14 LAUARA SNYDER: Maybe clarify it a little
15 bit.
16 GUY DANSIE: Darren, do you want to look
17 at it?
18 LAUARA SNYDER: And I don't -- I'm not
19 real familiar with all the agencies here in town.
20 Like there's South Salt Lake and all of these -- UFA,
21 South Salt Lake is a good one. So there's lots of
22 these in here. And it used to be that you would
23 license them as a 91-- you know, an ambulance service
24 paramedic provider, and here's your geographical
25 service area, and you do anything and everything. If

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1 you don't want to do something, then you have to have
2 a service agreement with somebody. What's wrong with
3 that?
4 GUY DANSIE: Nothing.
5 LAUARA SNYDER: Why did that all have to
6 change? So now why do they have to apply for just a
7 911-only because Gold Cross or Guardian, or whoever,
8 is going to be the inter-facility ones.
9 So what I'm thinking is if the State gives
10 them a license -- because right now you've said mine
11 has changed. Right now they're like "We don't want
12 to do inter-- anybody, XYZ ambulance, we don't want
13 to do inter-facilities. And so we are happy. Just
14 give us a 911 license."
15 And then in two years or in between the
16 licensure re-certification, they get a new city
17 council, whatever. And those guys decide, "No, this
18 is our service area. We want you to utilize all the
19 of resources, and we want you to do those."
20 And now they're held to --
21 GUY DANSIE: They can do that, but they
22 have to go through a new license application, which
23 would be opposed and it would go through a hearing
24 process.
25 LAUARA SNYDER: I know. So why create all

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1 of that when -- if you just leave it that it's all
2 theirs. And if they don't want to do it, then they
3 have a service agreement with somebody who does.
4 That would sure be a lot easier.
5 GUY DANSIE: It would be, but that's not
6 how it is in the statute. The statute says that
7 anybody with those agreements prior to September of
8 '99, if they want it they have to apply for a new
9 license to go through an adjudicated proceeding. So
10 that's what it says is in 416.
11 LAUARA SNYDER: I didn't read that for a
12 while.
13 GUY DANSIE: And I'm not here to dispute
14 the statute. I'm just saying: Does this language
15 look like it's okay? Do you want to change it?
16 JAY DEE DOWNS: What you were aiming for?
17 GUY DANSIE: I honestly don't care. I
18 mean, the statute, I don't --
19 LAUARA SNYDER: It doesn't affect me
20 personally.
21 GUY DANSIE: It doesn't affect me
22 personally either. It's not --
23 LAUARA SNYDER: So I'm looking at you
24 would save a whole lot of governmental money and time
25 and everything and hearings --

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1 GUY DANSIE: -- if the statute was
2 changed.
3 LAUARA SNYDER: Yeah.
4 GUY DANSIE: I agree.
5 DARREN PARK: How many agencies currently
6 have an 911 exclusive license?
7 GUY DANSIE: I think about six or eight or
8 something in that ballpark. It's UFA, South Salt
9 Lake, West Valley, Sandy, Murray. But they have some
10 exceptions. Draper has a new license, but it's a
11 911-only without the agreement. And West Jordan
12 reapplied and went through public comment and got a
13 new license to change theirs, so they don't have a
14 service agreement either. But theirs is 911-only.
15 DARREN PARK: So you have -- currently
16 have agencies with 911-only licenses doing
17 inter-facility.
18 GUY DANSIE: Correct. And that's the
19 real -- that's the problem. That's why the language
20 is going on overhaul.
21 LAUARA SNYDER: My thing would be to
22 change the statute instead of fix the rules to do
23 that.
24 GUY DANSIE: I totally agree. And I'm
25 telling you we're looking at doing that very thing.

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1 But the statute can't be changed until it goes
2 through the legislature.
3 DARREN PARK: And I can speak to the
4 difficulty of doing that.
5 GUY DANSIE: Yeah. It's a mess honestly.
6 DARREN PARK: Yeah.
7 GUY DANSIE: But -- so what we're left
8 with at this point, before the statute is changed, is
9 actually trying to clarify what the 911-only means in
10 rural. So I tried to mirror the inter-facility
11 language with the 911-only language and describe what
12 they're allowed to do.
13 I mean if you guys want to object, that's
14 fine.
15 JAY DEE DOWNS: I --
16 LAUARA SNYDER: The grammar is good.
17 JAY DEE DOWNS: Let me ask you one
18 question. I've got one question for you.
19 GUY DANSIE: Okay.
20 JAY DEE DOWNS: These nine units, these
21 nine agencies that are 911-only, are they being
22 currently -- is there area hospitals, or whatever,
23 being currently serviced by somebody who has a
24 license for the inter-facility transfer?
25 GUY DANSIE: I would say half and half. I

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1 think the issue, and honestly --
2 JAY DEE DOWNS: Okay. The ones that -- my
3 other question is if they haven't, the half that
4 haven't, then why aren't they just getting their
5 inter-facility license?
6 GUY DANSIE: Why are they not getting
7 their inter-facility, because they fall under that
8 group that has the agreements prior to 1999. They
9 can't. They have to re-apply for a new license --
10 JAY DEE DOWN: To get it.
11 GUY DANSIE: -- without the service
12 agreement.
13 DARREN PARK: At which time Gold Cross
14 will oppose.
15 GUY DANSIE: Will oppose. And then it
16 goes through the hearing.
17 JAY DEE DOWNS: Who does the transfers now
18 for those areas?
19 GUY DANSIE: Gold Cross.
20 JAY DEE DOWNS: So Gold Cross has
21 inter-facility license for that area already.
22 DARREN PARK: So Gold Cross has the
23 inter-facility license. However, a number of
24 departments are doing inter-facility transfers, and
25 there is currently legal action taking place.

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1 GUY DANSIE: Right. That's why the
2 department is putting this in here to clarify what
3 they're allowed to do and what they're not allowed to
4 do. Whether we agree or disagree -- I mean, if you
5 don't like the language --
6 JAY DEE DOWNS: It --
7 LAUARA SNYDER: The language is fine. My
8 problem is with the statute. So let's get that
9 statute fixed. We've argued that for I don't know
10 how long.
11 GUY DANSIE: Talk to your representative.
12 I know you know his number.
13 LAUARA SNYDER: I haven't talked to him
14 for a long time. But, yeah, I could probably do
15 that.
16 GUY DANSIE: And actually we will, as a
17 department, probably pursue changes in the statute
18 based on this issue. I think, to me, it's a little
19 bit of a boondoggle. We're just trying to do our
20 best to put a Band-Aid on it with the rule change
21 until the statute can be changed.
22 LAUARA SNYDER: I know this is a little
23 off topic but not exactly.
24 This Guardian transport that --
25 GUY DANSIE: Guardian is not licensed to

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1 do medical transports. They do, I know, do
2 transports probably illegally. However --
3 LAUARA SNYDER: On a regular basis. And
4 here's how I know. My husband had this acute abdomen
5 problem out in the U of U Parkview -- it was way out
6 in West Jordan/South Jordan somewhere. And he was in
7 a pretty bad place.
8 And so the doc comes in and says, "You
9 need immediate surgery. We're going to call Guardian
10 ambul-- Guardian to transport you."
11 He didn't say "ambulance."
12 "We're going to call Guardian to transport
13 you up for the surgery immediate."
14 And I'm like, "So are you going to keep
15 his IVs and everything on him?"
16 And the doctor said, "Yes, yes."
17 And I said, "Will he be on a stretcher
18 with his IVs and stuff in Guardian?"
19 "Yeah, we do it all the time."
20 GUY DANSIE: Well, they're out of line.
21 File a complaint.
22 LAUARA SNYDER: I'm not going to file a
23 complaint.
24 REGINA NELSON: It's her husband.
25 LAUARA SNYDER: It's my husband.

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1 GUY DANSIE: Well, he's not the one that
2 you're complaining about. I mean if he got
3 substandard care and he should have been in an
4 ambulance --
5 LAUARA SNYDER: Final he started crashing,
6 and then they said, "Oh, better call Gold Cross" --
7 or no, whoever wrote that.
8 DARREN PARK: South Jordan.
9 LAUARA SNYDER: Yeah, South Jordan. And
10 they did a great job.
11 The point is that these providers, they're
12 not the ones doing the licensing. And they get the
13 sales pitch and they go, "Yeah, yeah. We use them
14 all the time."
15 And exactly right, I'm the doctor; I write
16 the orders. I send them out with IVs hanging, and
17 they're on a stretcher.
18 GUY DANSIE: Right. The doctors need to
19 be aware they're breaking statute.
20 LAUARA SNYDER: Well, the U of U is the
21 one that came in and endorsed it and are the ones
22 using them.
23 GUY DANSIE: Right. And we need to file
24 complaints against these guys if that's the case.
25 LAUARA SNYDER: But you know what, I knew

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1 this was going to happen. I think a lot of people
2 did. I'm just saying it's going on.
3 GUY DANSIE: Right. And we need to crack
4 down on it if there's something illegal going on. I
5 need to have some evidence that they're doing
6 something wrong. The problem I -- huh?
7 DARREN PARK: If you don't tell him, he
8 doesn't have any evidence.
9 GUY DANSIE: That's true. I haven't had a
10 complaint to investigate. Roger will go out and find
11 out if there's a complaint.
12 LAUARA SNYDER: Well, he ended up going in
13 a real ambulance like he should have to begin with.
14 JAY DEE DOWNS: Time to go undercover.
15 DARREN PARK: Okay, Geraldo.
16 LAUARA SNYDER: This whole inter-facility
17 transport thing is just a boondoggle, and this is
18 just a Band-Aid.
19 GUY DANSIE: It is a Band-Aid. Maybe it's
20 not the best attempt, but that's what I'm kind of
21 stuck with.
22 And then in R426-3-500, it was "shall"
23 that we put "may" because Brittany -- this is on
24 the --
25 GAY BROGDON: Number 4.

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1 GUY DANSIE: Yeah, number 4.
2 The reason is in the statute it says,
3 "They may enter into mutual aid agreements."
4 And we've always said that they have to
5 have them. But according to statute, they are "may."
6 So we just are mirroring the statute with putting the
7 word "may" instead of "shall" there. We were
8 overregulating that.
9 We're still saying you have to have a
10 written agreement if you do have one though. But
11 that's the standard that it's got to be written. I
12 don't think we had any others.
13 GAY BROGDON: Under 900?
14 GUY DANSIE: Where, 900?
15 There's a whole bunch.
16 GUY DANSIE: Oh, let me get to that.
17 JAY DEE DOWNS: We discussed this once
18 before, didn't we?
19 GUY DANSIE: Yeah. I think this is part
20 of the stuff that we approved previously, but we
21 haven't -- we were waiting on this part of it. This
22 is aid agreements.
23 Yeah, this is where Brittany gave me
24 her -- shot down our path. We had language approved
25 by the task force and the EMS committee to enter into

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1 mutual aid agreements on a -- when you were issued a
2 license, you're expected to provide mutual aid to
3 your surrounding areas, unless you opt out through
4 written declaration, or whatever, when you do your
5 licensing.

6 Brittany said we'd have a hard time doing
7 that because of the "may" thing. So I softened the
8 language in one and I said they're "expected to
9 participate in mutual aid for adjoined geographical
10 service areas."

11 "...they may be called upon to provide
12 assistance during times of unusual demand."

13 "Exceptions for this expectation should be
14 submitted as part of a license application."

15 We just want to know if you are not going
16 to do that when you apply for your license. So we're
17 not going to say "You can't have a license." We're
18 just saying, "If you don't want to provide any
19 support to your surrounding areas, let us know."

20 JAY DEE DOWNS: Otherwise, just assume
21 that you are.

22 GUY DANSIE: Right. That's the
23 expectation.

24 JAY DEE DOWNS: Okay.

25 GUY DANSIE: And then other types of aid

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1 agreement shall be in writing assigned to both
2 parties. So if you have -- like you want specialty
3 transports coming into your area or something and you
4 want an agreement, they should be in writing or shall
5 in writing.

6 JAY DEE DOWNS: So under 1, does it -- so
7 basically I don't have to go out and seek mutual aid
8 agreements with all of my partners around me.

9 GUY DANSIE: Right. So that's the
10 expectation. So you assume --

11 JAY DEE DOWNS: We have those on file with
12 you. But if I do other places, then I have to.

13 GUY DANSIE: You should in your
14 application.

15 JAY DEE DOWNS: Yeah. That's what I'm
16 saying though is I don't really need to go around
17 and --

18 GUY DANSIE: We're not going to come out
19 and punish you if we don't know about them.

20 JAY DEE DOWNS: No. But it's expected
21 already it's going to be that way.

22 GUY DANSIE: For your adjoined areas.

23 JAY DEE DOWNS: Yes. That's my point I
24 don't have to go out there and have all these
25 different mutual aid agreements.

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1 GUY DANSIE: Right. We want to know if
2 you're opting out for some reason. But if you're not
3 going to do it, then why or --

4 JAY DEE DOWNS: So by this, then your plan
5 of operations should be using all of your surrounding
6 partners first and then calling in to the State so
7 they can invoke theirs so that --

8 GUY DANSIE: Or you can use other ones if
9 you have outside the adjoined areas.

10 JAY DEE DOWNS: Right. But if you don't
11 have that, then you just use the State and they bring
12 in other ones. So like for example up in Cache, I
13 use Box Elder and Weber.

14 GUY DANSIE: Only when needed in a
15 disaster situation.

16 JAY DEE DOWNS: Yeah. Then I call you to
17 bring in Davis and Salt Lake.

18 GUY DANSIE: Right. This is more just
19 housekeeping. We are trying to make the licensing
20 process easier. We said in the statute, we said
21 "may" have mutual aid agreements. So we're not
22 requiring them. We're saying we're expecting you to
23 have them with your adjoined areas.

24 JAY DEE DOWNS: Because if you had a
25 geographic area that had like a lot of mutual aid

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1 partners or ambulance services, you'd have a lot of
2 mutual aid contracts you'd have to gather.

3 GUY DANSIE: Right. We're just saying
4 don't sweat it. We'll expect you to have it, and let
5 us know if you don't.

6 JAY DEE DOWNS: Or you don't want to play.

7 GUY DANSIE: And Brittany is okay with
8 that. But we can't demand that you do have them.

9 And this language -- actually, that one
10 was changed because of Brittany's interpretation of
11 the statute. But the other part is basically -- I
12 believe it's just the language we passed last time.

13 But this didn't go -- like I said, it didn't go
14 through ProMed. We didn't make it effective because
15 of Brittany with the conflict of the statute and the
16 requirement. We still like the idea. It just
17 doesn't allow us to do it under statute.

18 JAY DEE DOWNS: Okay.

19 GUY DANSIE: So I'll push it up the chain
20 now and see where it goes.

21 Is that good for 3?

22 JAY DEE DOWNS: Yeah.

23 GUY DANSIE: Do you want to go to 5? We
24 will get Darren out of here.

25 Did you get your problem solved?

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1 DARREN PARK: Yeah.
2 GUY DANSIE: Okay. I'll save this one.
3 LAUARA SNYDER: We don't have 5. We have
4 3 and --
5 GUY DANSIE: I know, I know. This was a
6 last-minute thing, and it's not on the agenda. But
7 my understanding is --
8 DARREN PARK: It wasn't me. It was CCEU.
9 GUY DANSIE: Yeah. And it was another
10 department thing that we've got to have. But we
11 wanted to give it to you to look at.
12 It's 426-5. It's got to be the most
13 painful part of our rule. This is where we have all
14 the new dispatch stuff. That was actually already
15 approved by the EMS committee.
16 REGINA NELSON: Okay.
17 GUY DANSIE: But it hasn't been made
18 effective because we were pushing these other changes
19 to get all of them in at the same time.
20 And while it's open and going to comment,
21 we decided that there's a couple of little tweaks
22 that Darren has with the CC-- you met last week or
23 what was it? The peer-reviewed board?
24 DARREN PARK: Oh, no. The last we met was
25 August. But they requested that we bring a rule

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1 revision from the peer-review board. This actually
2 started in our May meeting. That rule revision was
3 then discussed with the -- with Brittany, the AG's
4 office. As is I guess -- I guess the way things are
5 structured because it's a rule revision emanating
6 from within the Bureau, it technically doesn't have
7 to come before the task force. However, we felt that
8 because of the history that exists here with
9 peer-review and this whole process and the task force
10 being involved in that from its very inception, that
11 it was appropriate that we keep the task force in the
12 loop. Because the task force has reviewed every
13 piece of rule that created the peer-reviewed board
14 and the bounds under which the peer-review board
15 operates. And so we wanted to keep the task force in
16 the loop.
17 Some of these things are simply
18 housekeeping changes. The issue you see right there.
19 GUY DANSIE: Highlighted in yellow?
20 DARREN PARK: Yeah, highlighted in yellow.
21 It is in reference to under the current parameters
22 under which peer-review operates and what peer-review
23 actually sees and is, I guess for lack of a better
24 term, prosecuted under peer-review, the B and C
25 misdemeanors under the Utah Criminal Code have been

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1 removed from what is reviewable by peer-review and by
2 the CCEU.
3 However, this is the one exception to that
4 rule is that to more accurately capture the -- what
5 goes on in the criminal justice system in regard to
6 impaired driving and DUI, most of those cases are
7 pled down to an impaired driving charge which is
8 covered under Section 41-6-A-502.5 in the Utah
9 Criminal Code. And that is a class B misdemeanor.
10 In meeting with the CCEU, the peer-review
11 board felt that that was something that should fall
12 under the purview of CCEU and peer-review for review
13 of licensure. And so Section 502.5 has now been
14 inserted into the peer-review rule to cover that one
15 class B misdemeanor.
16 GUY DANSIE: This is the reference.
17 Because of the proposed rule changes, we had to
18 change the reference on this one.
19 DARREN PARK: So that's just a
20 housekeeping issue that referenced the proper portion
21 of the rule.
22 GUY DANSIE: Okay.
23 DARREN PARK: For those of you who don't
24 know me, I am coming to you as the soon-to-be-former
25 chairman of the peer-review board.

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1 REGINA NELSON: Thank you. I was going to
2 ask you when this was all over. It may be off record
3 even. I was going to be like: Who is the
4 peer-review board now? Because I was in touch with
5 Dennis Bane [phonetic] earlier, actually last week.
6 And he identified that everybody that needed to be on
7 the board has currently has been selected and --
8 GUY DANSIE: -- positions are filled.
9 REGINA NELSON: The positions are filled,
10 and there isn't any need. But I can still fill out
11 an application if I'm interested in being a backup,
12 maybe an proxy or something. I don't know if you
13 guys even allow that, if there is a need.
14 So you're the former chair?
15 DARREN PARK: Yeah, I was the initial
16 chair. And I've served my two-year term as the
17 chair. I still have four years left in my term on
18 the board.
19 REGINA NELSON: I see.
20 DARREN PARK: Bt I'm also the one that got
21 this whole thing rolling, I guess.
22 LAUARA SNYDER: You're a troublemaker too.
23 DARREN PARK: Yes, exactly. So I'm the
24 one that got the legislation passed that created the
25 peer-review board and then served as the initial

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1 chair. And now I'll be just a board member for the
2 next four years.

3 JAY DEE DOWNS: Who is the new chair?
4 DARREN PARK: Don Marrelli.

5 So then this portion of the rule change is
6 coming from the CCEU, and there will be a language
7 change to this that I've just discussed with Roger.

8 GUY DANSIE: Do you know what it is? Do
9 you want me to put that --

10 DARREN PARK: Not yet. In essence what it
11 will say -- what this is discussion is what the CC --
12 this section of the rule under number 4, this is 4J
13 under 3200.

14 GUY DANSIE: I'm going to back up.
15 DARREN PARK: Yeah, this is Rule
16 R426-5-3200 4J.

17 GUY DANSIE: Okay.

18 DARREN PARK: And 4 discusses exactly what
19 the CCEU and peer-review board will investigate.
20 This is, in addition to that, to allow CCEU to issue
21 a Garrity warning to the individual. And the
22 addition that will come in here is that somewhere
23 within this, it will clarify that CCEU is the one
24 issuing the Garrity warning. This is not a result of
25 CCEU calling the agency and saying, "We want the

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1 information that you gathered when you issued a
2 Garrity warning to your employee."

3 This is a separate matter. CCEU as a
4 license -- the Bureau, as a licensing agency, has the
5 ability under statute to issue a Garrity warning and
6 to compel someone to answer. And so this is just in
7 rule, you know, stating that the CCEU can, when
8 necessary, issue a Garrity warning, compel the
9 individual to --

10 LAUARA SNYDER: So it gives --
11 DARREN PARK: -- answer the questions.
12 LAUARA SNYDER: -- you bite behind the
13 bark.

14 DARREN PARK: It does. Garrity gives
15 that. But Garrity also offers you the protection of
16 anything discovered under Garrity cannot be used in a
17 criminal proceeding.

18 But the whole -- which under this is very
19 unlikely that we're going to discover anything new
20 because CCEU doesn't really initiate their
21 investigation until after the criminal proceedings
22 have been resolved. So it would be highly unlikely
23 that they would uncover, through their investigation,
24 new criminal acts or anything like that.

25 So it simply gives them the ability to use

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1 Garrity to say, "Yes, you have to answer our
2 questions; you cannot refuse to answer; you have no
3 Fifth Amendment right."

4 And if you don't, we will take it to
5 peer-review that you failed to do that, and the
6 consequences are then listed as the actions the
7 peer-review can take or the Bureau can recommend to
8 take.

9 So the only difference in what you're
10 seeing there is it will be clarified that it is the
11 CCEU who issues the Garrity, and that they're not
12 going to be the requesting the Garrity findings from
13 the employer.

14 And then this last piece that Guy is
15 bringing up again was direction given to me as the
16 chair from the peer-review board to request this rule
17 change. Again, after discussions with the AG, we
18 don't necessarily have to request it through
19 peer-review -- or through the task force. But to
20 keep you guys in the loop and out of a matter of
21 courtesy and respect, we wanted to make you aware of
22 it. And that is that in the venue basically that
23 peer-review has of recommendations to give to the
24 Bureau to take action against someone's licensure, we
25 were -- it's this or this or this or this or this,

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1 and there wasn't a provision to allow for a
2 combination of any of these actions. And so what
3 this does is simply allow for a combination of
4 disciplinary actions to take place or to be
5 recommended by peer-review.

6 The final action is then up to the
7 director. But if in the peer-review proceedings the
8 board says, "Oh, we'd kind of like to see this and
9 this," this would then give them and the director the
10 ability to do that.

11 Any questions? Concerns?
12 JAY DEE DOWNS: No. Totally
13 understandable.

14 DARREN PARK: Okay.
15 GUY DANSIE: Okay. We'll --
16 DARREN PARK: Thank you very much. I
17 appreciate you giving me the time to --
18 GUY DANSIE: Anytime. We'll roll this on
19 through with all of the other.

20 LAUARA SNYDER: That's a lot of hard work.
21 Good job.

22 GUY DANSIE: Thanks, Darren.
23 DARREN PARK: And thank you for all your
24 hard work through this project. You've been here,
25 and -- you've been here since the beginning of this

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1 process as we've brought these many, many rule
2 changes to this body. And we appreciate all the hard
3 work you've done and the recommendations that you've
4 given us so that this process can be what it is
5 today.

6 GUY DANSIE: That's got to be the toughest
7 piece of rule, like I said. But we appreciate all
8 you've done.

9 DARREN PARK: Thanks again.

10 GUY DANSIE: We've got it honed in now.
11 We're pretty tight on it.

12 DARREN PARK: Yeah, I don't foresee any
13 tweaks really in this rule in the foreseeable future.

14 I will put in a plug. Please get on the
15 website and fill out an application to be a member of
16 the peer-review board. Not that you don't really all
17 do enough. But, you know, it's nice to have a file
18 of those that should we need something if someone has
19 to resign from the board or they're dismissed due to
20 lack of attendance and that sort of thing, that we
21 have a file full of people who are willing to then
22 come and fill those spots.

23 So thank you.

24 GUY DANSIE: Thanks, Darren, that was
25 inspiring.

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1 DARREN PARK: Have a nice day you'll.

2 JAY DEE DOWNS: Good seeing you again.
3 Take care.

4 DARREN PARK: Likewise.

5 JAY DEE DOWNS: Aren't we about done?

6 GUY DANSIE: There's just 4.

7 GAY BROGDON: 4 and 5.

8 GUY DANSIE: 4 and 5. 6 I mean.

9 DARREN PARK: I'm okay. If I get up and
10 run, you guys can keep going.

11 GUY DANSIE: I think all we did in this
12 one is change the terminology to licensed.

13 REGINA NELSON: So we have reviewed this
14 in the past as well? Because this one seems familiar
15 to me as well. Correct?

16 GUY DANSIE: Yeah.

17 REGINA NELSON: Okay.

18 GUY DANSIE: And one thing that this one
19 does have is the -- I did change something in here.
20 The intent in 426-4-300 permits and inspections,
21 talks about the new ambulance requirements, okay?

22 JAY DEE DOWNS: We need to talk about
23 that.

24 GUY DANSIE: There was a problem the way
25 we had it worded before. The task force wanted us to

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1 word it a certain way, and we took it to the
2 committee. And they wanted us to see department
3 policy for ground ambulance standards. So we're
4 going to take it all out of the rule and put it in
5 policy.

6 Basically our policy will be this: That
7 we will accept CAAS or NFPA 1917. I think it's the
8 third version on theirs.

9 JAY DEE DOWNS: Yeah. The only question I
10 had with that -- and we talked about this the other
11 day, you and I -- what do we do with pumper
12 ambulances? Because they can't meet those standards.

13 LAUARA SNYDER: So does that mean like my
14 ambulance would have to have CAAS certification?

15 GUY DANSIE: Only if you're buying a brand
16 knew one.

17 JAY DEE DOWNS: You'd have to buy it to
18 that standard.

19 GUY DANSIE: If you have one spec'd out
20 and you're ordering a new one, then you have it
21 spec-d to CAAS I think it's version 1.0 or something.

22 JAY DEE DOWNS: The big change in the CAAS
23 and everything right now is that cot, secured cot.
24 It outlaws the antlers and put the secured
25 system in.

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1 GUY DANSIE: Right.

2 JAY DEE DOWNS: And the problem we've got
3 right now is one person is going throughout the State
4 saying "It's already in place." And she's making
5 everybody concerned that their current system is out
6 of date. But it's all of the new stuff that would be
7 coming in after the law is enacted.

8 GUY DANSIE: Right. And then, as you can
9 see, we still need to go -- it needs to be enacted.
10 It still hasn't been officially adopted.

11 JAY DEE DOWNS: So you're saying you would
12 take it out of the rule and put it in the department
13 policy?

14 GUY DANSIE: Yeah. The committee --
15 that's what the EMS committee decided to have us do.
16 I think it was in the spring, in the April meeting.

17 JAY DEE DOWNS: Was that the reason
18 though? Because what do we do with pumper
19 ambulances, Because they can't -- there's no way they
20 can meet the CAAS and NFPA standards.

21 GUY DANSIE: Well, if they can't be spec'd
22 to that, then that won't be the policy to have it
23 done that way.

24 JAY DEE DOWNS: You've got several of them
25 out there in the State, and I don't -- they'd be

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1 awfully hard to get to that standard.
2 GUY DANSIE: Right. And if they are
3 already existing, they're exempt anyway.
4 JAY DEE DOWNS: Yeah. Just if they were
5 built new, they'd have to built it to that. Just
6 because of the nature of the vehicle, it's going to
7 be tough to do that.
8 GUY DANSIE: Right. So that might be an
9 exemption to the policy.
10 JAY DEE DOWNS: Well, if it's a policy,
11 then the Bureau can waive the policy accordingly. If
12 it's not in the rule. I get what you're saying. I
13 get it.
14 GUY DANSIE: Yeah. And just so you know,
15 the cot thing is probably the biggest thing we've
16 always had heartburn with.
17 JAY DEE DOWNS: Well, that's because
18 somebody is out there stirring it up.
19 GUY DANSIE: Right. I'm very well aware
20 of it. I've had numerous phone calls.
21 JAY DEE DOWNS: So have I. I'm like
22 no-no. Because she's making it sound like everybody
23 needs to switch over their current system that they
24 have in their ambulances right now.
25 LAUARA SNYDER: She's a salesperson in the

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1 system?
2 GUY DANSIE: Yeah, she's a salesperson.
3 So she wants everybody to --
4 JAY DEE DOWNS: Which is 25 grand.
5 GUY DANSIE: Which I think is great. The
6 product is good; it's not a problem with that. It's
7 just that we aren't requiring it for existing.
8 JAY DEE DOWNS: No. So if you've to get a
9 new ambulance, get it purchased before June.
10 GUY DANSIE: Well, we had a deadline in
11 there, but the deadline came in and went. So I just
12 took the deadline language out. You can see that.
13 JAY DEE DOWNS: Well, it's just in policy.
14 And now it's up to the Bureau to say when they want
15 to put it in play.
16 GUY DANSIE: Right.
17 JAY DEE DOWNS: Although I would probably
18 give a good warning before you did.
19 GUY DANSIE: Yeah, well...
20 JAY DEE DOWN: Oh, by the way, that policy
21 was enacted yesterday.
22 GUY DANSIE: We'll send it out. When the
23 rule is effective, then we can send out a policy --
24 we will list the policy on the website. It has to be
25 like in a public accessible place where everybody can

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1 find it.
2 Okay. Under scene and patient management,
3 this is one other change that I was told by the
4 executive director's office that we need to add
5 language. This goes back to that issue with the
6 911-only licenses. And so this is an attempt to
7 clarify who shall be dispatched under what
8 situations.
9 It's actually very soft language. It
10 seems like a no-brainer to me that "all patient
11 transports shall be performed by the appropriate
12 licensed ambulance type and level of service."
13 JAY DEE DOWNS: So in the situation that
14 Lauara was talking about with her husband then, you
15 can't -- this would be part of the rule that you
16 would go out there and bring to their attention, so
17 to speak.
18 GUY DANSIE: Yeah.
19 JAY DEE DOWNS: But you can't do that
20 unless somebody says at this specific time this
21 specific thing happened, correct?
22 GUY DANSIE: Right. Right.
23 And the other problem we have -- and I'll
24 be frank with you, the problem we have with Guardian
25 or anybody else that's doing this is the doctors are

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1 saying that that's the appropriate care. So we can
2 educate the doctors and say, "We don't think you're
3 acting right."
4 But with doctors orders, are we -- the
5 problem is I'm not going to go overrule a doctor on
6 what's best for the patient.
7 JAY DEE DOWNS: In your rules the doctor
8 determines what kind of transport they'll have.
9 GUY DANSIE: That's exactly right.
10 LAUARA SNYDER: Also though, think of it
11 this way, the doctors are answering to the
12 administration of the hospital who have made
13 contractual agreements with Guardian.
14 GUY DANSIE: Totally understand. Totally
15 agree.
16 LAUARA SNYDER: So they're not going to
17 choose --
18 GUY DANSIE: I've spoken with the people
19 from the University of Utah, and I've visited
20 attorneys with them. And I know --
21 LAUARA SNYDER: They're like we can do it.
22 GUY DANSIE: And we say "Here's the
23 statute. Follow the statute."
24 JAY DEE DOWNS: But it goes back to the
25 transporting van service that's doing it that you're

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1 going to have to somehow get licensed.
2 GUY DANSIE: I agree. I think somehow we
3 need something that's less than an ambulance that's
4 regulated.
5 JAY DEE DOWNS: Because the only teeth
6 you're going to have is if we're going to legislation
7 for it --
8 GUY DANSIE: The only thing I regulate are
9 ambulances and above.
10 JAY DEE DOWNS: Right. My point is if
11 you're going to legislate to fix this other problem,
12 include that language in it.
13 GUY DANSIE: I agree. I think we need
14 that middle -- we need to regulate something that's
15 more economical than an ambulance but still
16 regulated.
17 JAY DEE DOWNS: You're probably talking
18 about BHUs too.
19 GUY DANSIE: Yeah, that's what Guardian
20 mostly does.
21 LAUARA SNYDER: What's a BHU?
22 GUY DANSIE: Behavior health. We call
23 them psych.
24 LAUARA SNYDER: Well, you know, that's how
25 they came in, and that was the big selling point.

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1 We're just here to take him from NAMI, or whatever.
2 It's a behavioral health thing and now --
3 GUY DANSIE: Technically if you read the
4 statute, mental health issues --
5 LAUARA SNYDER: -- is an emergency
6 medical --
7 GUY DANSIE: That need attention while
8 they're transport also in an ambulance.
9 LAUARA SNYDER: I know.
10 GUY DANSIE: But the fire services are not
11 fighting that part of it because it's a loser for
12 them anyway, so they don't care.
13 LAUARA SNYDER: Right.
14 GUY DANSIE: But then the -- somebody that
15 has a health condition that needs to be observed is
16 also sliding under there.
17 LAUARA SNYDER: And do you know what, the
18 thing that I've had to smile about this is most of
19 the patients, they don't have a clue. It's like
20 okay.
21 GUY DANSIE: Well, the doctor is ordering
22 it.
23 LAUARA SNYDER: Yeah. The doctor is
24 ordering it; he knows best.
25 JAY DEE DOWNS: Right.

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1 GUY DANSIE: Right.
2 LAUARA SNYDER: And he probably was
3 surprised when I'm like, "Are you sure he can go with
4 these IVs hanging?"
5 JAY DEE DOWNS: Here's a question -- and
6 if that's the case then that's -- so let's say her
7 husband did go with the Guardian van service and
8 something bad happens. So now does she have a
9 lawsuit against the doc?
10 GUY DANSIE: I would think probably she
11 would. I'm not an attorney, but I would think so.
12 (Side discussion.)
13 GUY DANSIE: I think as I go through this
14 on the electronic -- you guys look at the hard
15 copies. But I believe those are the only changes,
16 and then it's the certification/license things I've
17 pointed out.
18 The vehicle standards and then the
19 clarification that only vehicles that are appropriate
20 for their service -- their license type and service
21 level should respond. Okay. You guys good with
22 that?
23 JAY DEE DOWNS: Okie-dokie.
24 GUY DANSIE: The last piece we want to
25 look at -- and this is new -- this is the grant

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1 subcommittee that wanted us to put this in. And
2 there's also --
3 JAY DEE DOWNS: Which one are we looking
4 at?
5 GUY DANSIE: This is 426-6. This is the
6 grants.
7 RANDY WILDEN: What is the number again?
8 JAY DEE DOWNS: 426-6-1.
9 RANDY WILDEN: I'm with you.
10 JAY DEE DOWNS: Awesome, thank you.
11 GUY DANSIE: As we look through -- this is
12 for the grant subcommittee -- this is the language
13 that they were good with. "Grants available only to
14 ground -- to licensed ground 911." They wanted to
15 add that.
16 REGINA NELSON: Who is on the grants
17 committee? Who's a grant committee member?
18 GUY DANSIE: Ron Morris is the chair. Don
19 Marrelli, Mike Mathieu, Kathy Cornberg [phonetic],
20 Jeremy Hoggard.
21 LAUARA SNYDER: A request for a rule
22 change, this is going to have some significant
23 impact. But whenever there is that, there's a
24 reason. Like an incident comes up so we need to have
25 a rule or something to fix it. So what was the

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1 problem with this one that there was this need to fix
2 it?

3 GUY DANSIE: There was a disagreement on
4 how the grants were administered in the St. George
5 area.

6 JAY DEE DOWNS: Oh.

7 GUY DANSIE: And the grants subcommittee
8 recommended that it -- the award be given to the
9 first responder for St. George. And Mike Moffitt,
10 Gold Cross, argued that they also respond in areas
11 that St. George doesn't, such as the Virgin River
12 Gorge, down that way. So we had quite a debate over
13 that. I know Mike Mathieu and Mike Moffitt, they've
14 discussed it. This is the recommendation that the
15 grants subcommittee put together.

16 One of the issues also, as we began to
17 talk with the appropriate use of public funds for
18 public or private providers or nonprofit providers,
19 is that we were giving some grant money to air
20 ambulance services. So that's why we put "ground" in
21 there. Because some of them were nonprofit, and it
22 didn't specify whether air or ground. They felt like
23 the funds were probably not going to impact severely
24 Life Flight or AirMed, two non-profits who were
25 receiving grant money. And that small amount should

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1 be diverted to the ground services.

2 LAUARA SNYDER: Okay. So in the St.
3 George area -- and I wasn't aware of this -- but
4 who -- who would get the money? Right now it's both,
5 right?

6 GUY DANSIE: We talked about that for, I'd
7 say, an hour.

8 GAY BROGDON: Or more.

9 GUY DANSIE: Yeah. And the issue really
10 is should it go to St. George Fire for their quick
11 response, or should it go to Gold Cross for their
12 paramedic licensed ambulance.

13 LAUARA SNYDER: Okay. And does the fire
14 have a smaller service area?

15 GUY DANSIE: That's what we were talking
16 about, and that was part of it. So the way we worded
17 it was if they have a first response -- a public
18 first response --

19 GAY BROGDON: Inside.

20 GUY DANSIE: -- designated or licensed
21 inside of their service area, that that would
22 disqualify them from receiving grants.

23 GAY BROGDON: Because the idea is the
24 money to go to nonprofit --

25 GUY DANSIE: Or public providers.

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1 GAY BROGDON: -- or public providers. Not
2 private.

3 GUY DANSIE: It wouldn't affect you,
4 Lauara because --

5 LAUARA SNYDER: I know.

6 GUY DANSIE: Well, Wendover doesn't have
7 another response. You're the only --

8 JAY DEE DOWNS: Say that again. So down
9 there you have licensed provider that they have
10 designated. So the money would go to the designated
11 provider like say --

12 GUY DANSIE: Because it's public, and they
13 served in part of the Gold Cross service area that's
14 private.

15 GAY BROGDON: Gold Cross isn't eligible
16 because they are for profit. But they have a unit
17 inside that has that designation.

18 LAUARA SNYDER: Okay. That makes sense,
19 and I understand that.

20 But when I read this, I'm like, "Oh, the
21 only other place I could see this -- because there's
22 only three private companies in the state, Gold
23 Cross, me, and Mountain West. So the only place this
24 would affect --

25 GUY DANSIE: Also, we have Gunnison and

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1 Uintah Basin. They're the same as Mountain West.

2 LAUARA SNYDER: That's true.

3 So in Tooele though, Mountain West has
4 been getting grant money as the ambulance service
5 provider for the whole county, other than the portion
6 that I have down in Juab.

7 But now that North Tooele has a first
8 response thing, and I think Grantsville does to, QRU,
9 or whatever. Does that mean that Mountain West would
10 not be eligible for grants anymore? According to
11 this language, they wouldn't. So is this an
12 unintended consequence of that?

13 GUY DANSIE: It may or may not be. I
14 don't know.

15 JAY DEE DOWNS: That's what I was
16 thinking.

17 LAUARA SNYDER: This language is. Yeah,
18 it exactly is. And that's not so great either.

19 JAY DEE DOWNS: I thought they used to
20 give money to everybody that applied that was --

21 GUY DANSIE: Well, I thought -- does it
22 say public or nonprofit? The problem is I think they
23 are a for-profit hospital.

24 LAUARA SNYDER: Well, they are.

25 REGINA NELSON: For profit. And it says

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1 if there's no other one within the entire
2 geographical service area.
3 GUY DANSIE: So Grantsville having a QRU
4 would disqualify Mountain West?
5 REGINA NELSON: Yes. Right, Tooele -- or
6 North Tooele. Right, Chief?
7 GUY DANSIE: Right, yeah.
8 JAY DEE DOWNS: Wait a minute though. I
9 thought though so if you had a first responder
10 unit -- let's go back down to St. George. You have a
11 first responder designated unit which is St. George.
12 Now you have Gold Cross that's providing the licensed
13 service.
14 I thought before that they put -- they
15 were put in there for the per capita, and you divide
16 it out and these guys get so much and these guys get
17 so much. Now you're saying, no, it's just one lump
18 of money that goes to either or?
19 GUY DANSIE: That's what it's being
20 changed to because that was disputed in the
21 committee.
22 JAY DEE DOWNS: However, if they're not a
23 for-profit licensed agency and they're all public
24 entities, then everybody still gets a piece of the
25 pie? Wow. It sounded to me like something else was

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1 coming down the road.
2 GUY DANSIE: Do you think there's going to
3 be a fight?
4 JAY DEE DOWNS: Like what she said.
5 Because now you're going to say if there's that much
6 money, and Tooele County gets "x" amount of money.
7 And now you're dividing it up between two first
8 responder agencies and not the licensed provider --
9 LAUARA SNYDER: That's a problem. Because
10 they're the ones that -- it's a problem.
11 GUY DANSIE: Well, it --
12 LAUARA SNYDER: Hadn't thought of that.
13 Again it --
14 GUY DANSIE: No. I wash my hands of
15 grants criteria because we were saying licensing
16 issues for 911-only. That is a department power.
17 And so the department can basically say this is how
18 we're going to do it, period. But this is a
19 committee power exclusively with grants, the grants
20 criteria.
21 LAUARA SNYDER: Randy, you're from there.
22 Why don't you weigh in on this?
23 RANDY WILDEN: Well, I tried, but you guys
24 talk too much.
25 GUY DANSIE: Go ahead, Randy. Make out

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1 day.
2 RANDY WILDEN: You talked about
3 Grantsville. Grantsville, to my knowledge, no longer
4 has a QRU. They've allowed theirs to -- Mountain
5 West to do all of their first response and
6 transports.
7 THE REPORTER: Sorry, I can't hear you.
8 RANDY WILDEN: I said there's been talk
9 about Grantsville. Grantsville, to my knowledge,
10 gave up their QRU. They turned over everything to
11 Mountain West for their transport and their first
12 response. So it's just North Tooele and Mountain
13 West in that pie right now.
14 GUY DANSIE: Okay.
15 LAUARA SNYDER: So this new rule though
16 would negate Mountain West from receiving anything,
17 even though they're the first response and ambulance
18 transport for more than just Tooele City. They're
19 doing other parts of the county. And then that --
20 yeah. Yeah, because then North Tooele would get all
21 of that money because --
22 RANDY WILDEN: Yeah.
23 GUY DANSIE: Well, they wouldn't get all
24 of it. It would just be in the pot to be divided out
25 further.

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1 LAUARA SNYDER: It would be in the pot to
2 be divided where?
3 GUY DANSIE: The total amount of money --
4 LAUARA SNYDER: Oh, yeah, you don't
5 delegate it per county.
6 GUY DANSIE: They wouldn't get their piece
7 of the pie. So the pie would be a little bit bigger
8 for everybody else. For the whole state, not just
9 Mountain West.
10 LAUARA SNYDER: I think that we get away
11 from the purpose of what the grants are to begin
12 with, and they are supposed to help promote providing
13 EMS services to the public. And if you're, you know,
14 taking away from -- in Tooele County, now I'm a
15 little tiny part of Tooele County that's not affected
16 by this part. But if you're taking that away from
17 one of the largest providers of services in that
18 area, that's not -- I don't think that's the intent
19 of this grant money.
20 GUY DANSIE: So you --
21 LAUARA SNYDER: I don't think it's well
22 served to do that.
23 GUY DANSIE: Okay.
24 LAUARA SNYDER: And so I would have to
25 look maybe a little harder at what's going on down in

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1 St. George, and maybe they have -- I don't even know
2 the situation down there. Like I said, I thought it
3 was focused on Tooele because the only one that I
4 knew about.
5 REGINA NELSON: And I don't know why, but
6 Grantsville asked me to send a letter to the Bureau
7 of EMS. It's dated August of this year. And I
8 recertified that we are their 911 services for EMS.
9 So are they trying to just keep their
10 licensing for if they ever --
11 GUY DANSIE: Designation for their first
12 response.
13 REGINA NELSON: Yeah. Because they were
14 designated as a QRU.
15 GUY DANSIE: I don't know. I'd have to
16 find out.
17 GAY BROGDON: Grantsville has just never
18 applied for grants.
19 REGINA NELSON: They have not?
20 GAY BROGDON: Never applied for grants.
21 REGINA NELSON: I think they're keeping
22 their certification. They may not be running --
23 GAY BROGDON: I have Wendover, and I have
24 North Tooele.
25 RANDY WILDEN: We were told that

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1 Grantsville have reinstated a training officer. They
2 are going to try and re-certify some of their EMTs.
3 But beyond that we haven't heard of what their intent
4 is at that point. If they're going to back to a QRU
5 or if they're just going to maintain it as a "what
6 if." I can't answer that for them.
7 REGINA NELSON: I can't either.
8 But yeah, they just had me accomplish a
9 letter stating that we are their dispatch services
10 for their licensed area.
11 GAY BROGDON: The ambulance service of
12 Tooele, is that Mountain West?
13 GUY DANSIE: Mountain West.
14 GAY BROGDON: Okay.
15 GUY DANSIE: I don't know why we have it
16 named that way because their name is Mountain West.
17 It's not --
18 RANDY WILDEN: Okay. Well, I've got to go
19 to the quarterly meeting, so I'm going to hang up and
20 go back to my cell phone.
21 GUY DANSIE: Okay. That's fine, Randy.
22 LAUARA SNYDER: When they first got their
23 license, they were --
24 (RECORDING PLAYING FROM MR. WILDEN'S VOICEMAIL)
25 REGINA NELSON: So I lost track of

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1 Grantsville after -- I've got record in 2009 they
2 became a QRU, Grantsville Fire Department. And then
3 I know two years ago, because of their funding, they
4 weren't able to pay dispatching fees. Because we do
5 charge North Tooele for dispatch fees.
6 Grantsville held back from QRU response
7 and let the ambulance handle it. Whether they lost
8 their licensing or not, I don't know. But they're
9 asking me to send in all of the information that I
10 normally do re-certify them, so...
11 GUY DANSIE: So bottom line is you guys
12 don't like this.
13 LAUARA SNYDER: I don't. Until --
14 GUY DANSIE: And I think --
15 JAY DEE DOWNS: What came out of Mike
16 Mathieu and Mike Moffitt's meeting?
17 GUY DANSIE: Fur. I don't know.
18 JAY DEE DOWNS: I'm asking what came out
19 of the Mikes' meetings. I mean I've been in meetings
20 before with those two.
21 GUY DANSIE: Obviously Mike Moffitt thinks
22 Gold Cross is the game in town in St. George, and he
23 wants the grant money. And Mike Mathieu thinks
24 there's not that much money and privates who are
25 doing it for profit, probably shouldn't be using

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1 money that's des-- that the intent was to give it to
2 like these small public areas that are underserved or
3 underfunded.
4 JAY DEE DOWNS: Do you know what, we maybe
5 ought to push it up to the committee and let them --
6 GUY DANSIE: It's going to be a fight.
7 JAY DEE DOWNS: You know, I don't know if
8 we have enough information that we can really --
9 GUY DANSIE: That's something we ought to
10 point out is that we're concerned that Mountain West
11 will lose grant money if we pursue this.
12 JAY DEE DOWNS: I don't feel like I have
13 enough information to make a decision one way or the
14 other because of the unintended consequences. But
15 also there seems to be some ambiguity in there, so...
16 GUY DANSIE: We actually mentioned what
17 your situation in Cache is.
18 JAY DEE DOWNS: Everybody is a separate
19 entity.
20 GUY DANSIE: Everybody is all public. So
21 there's not a conflict there.
22 JAY DEE DOWNS: So there's only a few
23 places in the State of Utah that have that problem.
24 That would be the three agencies that have ambulance
25 services that are private for --

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1 GAY BROGDON: Yeah, only Mountain West.
2 LAUARA SNYDER: There's really only two
3 because there's no -- I don't have any competition in
4 my area.
5 GUY DANSIE: Yeah. So it would be
6 Mountain West and St. George Gold Cross.
7 JAY DEE DOWNS: You can receive grants,
8 right?
9 LAUARA SNYDER: Uh-huh (affirmative).
10 JAY DEE DOWNS: So technically you're part
11 of Tooele County.
12 LAUARA SNYDER: Yeah. I do cover part of
13 Tooele County. I cover out to the --
14 JAY DEE DOWNS: Yeah. So my point is --
15 GUY DANSIE: You are acting as the public
16 provider. See, the same thing, Gold Cross gets money
17 in Iron. And then they get money in Vernal because
18 they're the only game in town. So they get funding
19 for that. The dispute really is the St. George
20 issue.
21 JAY DEE DOWNS: I just don't think I have
22 enough information to say one way or the other from
23 my personal opinion.
24 GUY DANSIE: Okay.
25 JAY DEE DOWNS: Do you see what I'm

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1 saying? I don't understand what negated it or what
2 brought it on. I wasn't there for the argument,
3 so --
4 GUY DANSIE: This is a committee function
5 to decide what to do here.
6 LAUARA SNYDER: Well, let me --
7 JAY DEE DOWNS: Let's take it back to the
8 committee.
9 LAUARA SNYDER: I just was thinking down
10 in St. George with this thing, they have overlapping.
11 So you have your fire department here, right here in
12 town. And Gold Cross is over all of this. So
13 they're right in each other's faces almost.
14 In Tooele, that's not particularly the
15 case because Mountain West Ambulance covers a very
16 large area. North Tooele covers North Tooele. They
17 don't come in and help them out in Grantsville. They
18 don't come into Tooele City proper. So this is a
19 little bit different situation.
20 GAY BROGDON: A geographical situation.
21 LAUARA SNYDER: But by saying in here if
22 there's the -- the governmental part in any part of
23 their licensed area, then they're not eligible,
24 that's kind of overreaching. So I think there's a
25 compromise with this language to fix what you're

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1 wanting to fix down there. But not yet take --
2 GUY DANSIE: Take it away from Mountain
3 West.
4 LAUARA SNYDER: Yeah, take it away from
5 Mountain West Ambulance, who really is like the only
6 game in town for, say, Grantsville or Erda or --
7 JAY DEE DOWNS: It's down in the St.
8 George area. Call it what it is.
9 RANDY WILDEN: I don't think our
10 intent would ever be to --
11 THE REPORTER: I can't hear you.
12 JAY DEE DOWNS: You just hung up on him.
13 GAY BROGDON: I'm so sorry.
14 (Off-the-record discussion.)
15 GUY DANSIE: Okay. While we're waiting
16 for him, as we look at 426-6-2, B is the part that
17 talks about if there is no other license or
18 designated EMS provider within their entire
19 geographical service area.
20 What Lauara probably wants to do is strike
21 the word "entire," and we could say "the majority" or
22 something like that, soften that.
23 LAUARA SNYDER: Something.
24 GUY DANSIE: Because Mountain West --
25 LAUARA SNYDER: Overlapping. How about

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1 overlapping?
2 GUY DANSIE: Within the overlapping?
3 LAUARA SNYDER: Well, that's not going to
4 work either because North Tooele and Mountain West do
5 overlap some.
6 GUY DANSIE: If we said "majority" would
7 that get it? Because most of -- I think in Gold
8 Cross's case in St. George, that St. George probably
9 is in the majority of their service area.
10 LAUARA SNYDER: Uh-huh (affirmative).
11 GAY BROGDON: Hi Randy.
12 RANDY WILDEN: How are you all? It's a
13 long ways out here in Tooele County.
14 GAY BROGDON: It is my fault. I hit the
15 off button instead of turning volume on or up.
16 RANDY WILDEN: North Tooele has no
17 intention of fighting with Mountain West over grant
18 money. We need to share the money.
19 But if it's a matter of rule, then we
20 probably need to address that. We need Mountain
21 West; they need us. It's a -- it's symbiotic
22 relationship for us. But if it's a -- somewhere I
23 think we need more information as well if we're going
24 to make any recommendation.
25 LAUARA SNYDER: That's good, Randy.

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1 Because I think by saying what you've just said, it
2 will let the committee know this has to go back and
3 they have to mull it over.
4 Because Tooele is unintended consequence
5 of this writing for fixing the problem in St. George,
6 and it will be a problem. So we need to have them go
7 back. And I don't think they've considered that.
8 I'll be --
9 GUY DANSIE: No.
10 RANDY WILDEN: And I agree. It's an
11 unintended consequence to try and fix maybe one
12 little issue that there could be impact on areas that
13 don't want to be part of that fix.
14 GUY DANSIE: Okay. Duly noted. We'll
15 take that to the committee. The task force
16 recommends that we don't do this because it will harm
17 Mountain West.
18 REGINA NELSON: Okay. Can I make my note?
19 On number 1, it says -- do you want me to read the
20 whole thing?
21 "Grants are available only to licensed
22 ground 911 EMS ambulance providers, licensed
23 paramedic services, EMS designated quick response
24 units, and designated medical PSAP dispatch centers."
25 We are easily defined as a licensed

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1 emergency medical dispatch center, according to all
2 of our other rules. So if we just keep with "license
3 emergency medical service dispatch center."
4 GUY DANSIE: Yeah. The dispatch centers
5 are designated by us. You might be licensed by
6 public safety. We call it designated.
7 REGINA NELSON: Emergency medical --
8 licensed emergency medical service dispatch center.
9 GUY DANSIE: The only word I'm having a
10 hard time with is "licensed" because --
11 REGINA NELSON: In order for me to get a
12 grant though, I have to be licensed by you through --
13 right? If my center isn't licensed, I can't --
14 GUY DANSIE: When you say "license," who
15 licenses your center?
16 REGINA NELSON: You guys do.
17 GUY DANSIE: We designate it. If it's
18 licensed by somebody else, that's okay. We can say
19 that. If it's licensed by the State or public
20 safety. I'm just saying that one term, we designate.
21 We don't license. Just because our statute says we
22 designate.
23 If your statute says the public safety,
24 the 911, or whoever else for the rest of your PSAP
25 blessing licenses you, then we can say that. We can

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1 say "license PSAP." I don't have a problem with
2 that. But I'm just saying we don't license it; we
3 designate it.
4 REGINA NELSON: Okay. That term then.
5 GUY DANSIE: We can change the wording
6 then.
7 REGINA NELSON: Designated emergency
8 medical service dispatch center.
9 GUY DANSIE: Designated emergency --
10 REGINA NELSON: Service --
11 GUY DANSIE: -- medical --
12 REGINA NELSON: Designated emergency
13 medical service dispatch center.
14 GUY DANSIE: Dispatch -- do you want to
15 take the word "PSAP" out?
16 REGINA NELSON: Yes.
17 GUY DANSIE: Because Mike thought that it
18 should be in there. But if not, we'll remove it.
19 REGINA NELSON: I don't believe we called
20 it a PSAP. All of our -- even our rules are calling
21 it out as an emergency medical service dispatch
22 center.
23 GAY BROGDON: He was referring to it being
24 something in some new rule.
25 GUY DANSIE: Well, they're looking at

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1 their new rule that just went through.
2 GAY BROGDON: Because it's down in here
3 further too.
4 JAY DEE DOWNS: What does it say in our
5 designated rule for designated?
6 GUY DANSIE: That's what we call it is
7 that, a designated emergency medical dispatch center.
8 JAY DEE DOWNS: Then that's what it
9 should --
10 GUY DANSIE: I agree. I agree.
11 I think Mike just wanted to be called to
12 our attention that it was being called something
13 else, and he didn't like the way it was in there.
14 REGINA NELSON: For UCA you have to be a
15 primary PSAP in order to get grant money. We do have
16 secondary PSAP, such as Salt Lake Highway Patrol.
17 They cannot receive the UCA grants because they're
18 not a primary accepting a 911 call. UPD is in the
19 same boat. Beck answers their 911 calls, so they
20 don't receive grant money because of that. So I
21 worry --
22 GUY DANSIE: Should we put the word
23 "primary" in there somewhere? That what was -- that
24 was the discussion he had with us, that they need to
25 be a primary PSAP.

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1 REGINA NELSON: Do you guys -- have you in
2 the past? I guess this is my question because I
3 don't want to have another unintended consequence. I
4 would hate to see if Salt Lake Highway Patrol or
5 Unified Police Department have in the past received
6 Bureau --
7 GAY BROGDON: In the past they have --
8 they have they have never applied in the past years
9 I've been involved.
10 REGINA NELSON: So they're not licensed.
11 They don't take the 911 calls. They don't -- they're
12 not EMD certified. They don't take a 911 call. None
13 of those agencies that I'm aware of go and get that.
14 GUY DANSIE: Can we put and PSAPs --
15 primary PSAPs who are designated as emergency medical
16 dispatchers? Would that work?
17 REGINA NELSON: Uh-huh (affirmative).
18 GUY DANSIE: I'll add that.
19 REGINA NELSON: Primary PSAPs.
20 JAY DEE DOWNS: You could compromise
21 there, Guy.
22 LAUARA SNYDER: You've been working around
23 these EMS people too long.
24 REGINA NELSON: Yep. You've covered it
25 all. There won't be any consequences on that one

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1 when we add that in there. That's very clear.
2 GAY BROGDON: We put that wording also
3 down also under 4-3.
4 REGINA NELSON: 4-3. Did I miss it?
5 Sorry if I did.
6 GAY BROGDON: It's under where it says,
7 "For the number of licensed personnel based on" -- da
8 da, da -- "designated medical dispatch center..." we
9 put PSAP in there. It's in red.
10 GUY DANSIE: I'm going down to it.
11 GAY BROGDON: It's under number 5 -- or 6.
12 It's on the second page.
13 GUY DANSIE: Designated.
14 REGINA NELSON: Oh, right there.
15 GAY BROGDON: Does that need to be
16 changed?
17 GUY DANSIE: Yes, it does. Let's put that
18 "primary" language in there too.
19 REGINA NELSON: So again they've never
20 come and asked for any money. They don't fit the
21 criteria. And this just helps identify that they
22 could not misunderstand and come and apply because
23 they're not a primary PSAP.
24 GAY BROGDON: Right.
25 REGINA NELSON: And not licensed through

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1 you guys.
2 GAY BROGDON: Right.
3 GUY DANSIE: PSAP because that was new
4 language, even though it wasn't underlined. Okay.
5 Are you good with that? So it's paralleled and the
6 same language. "Primary PSAPs who are designated
7 emergency medical service dispatch centers."
8 REGINA NELSON: Just "primary PSAP."
9 Public Safety Answering Point.
10 GUY DANSIE: I'll do the same up above if
11 I can get there.
12 REGINA NELSON: Thank you.
13 GUY DANSIE: Do we need and "a" -- "and a
14 primary"?
15 GAY BROGDON: It's not plural. Instead of
16 who?
17 GUY DANSIE: "Which are." Should we put
18 "which"?
19 REGINA NELSON: Which are.
20 GUY DANSIE: Okay. Where was the other
21 one in here?
22 Does that work? Good. Okay.
23 REGINA NELSON: Yep.
24 GUY DANSIE: We will tell Mike that that's
25 what we decided. I'll say Regina told us how it

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1 needs to be.
2 Yeah, I think it clarifies it. It's
3 primary PSAP and its designated EMS dispatch. I'm
4 good with that.
5 REGINA NELSON: Thank you.
6 GUY DANSIE: Thank you. I think that's
7 it. Do we have anything else?
8 GAY BROGDON: We have the rule that we can
9 penalize.
10 GUY DANSIE: Okay. We got the dispatch
11 center thing ironed out.
12 This was main reason we brought this to
13 the table, besides the private versus public issue.
14 One of the problems we've had is that the awards are
15 given, and then people -- services don't use their
16 grant money.
17 LAUARA SNYDER: I read that. Where is
18 that? The second page?
19 GAY BROGDON: First page.
20 GUY DANSIE: It's 5.
21 GAY BROGDON: Number 5 on the first page.
22 GUY DANSIE: Yeah, part 5 under section 2.
23 REGINA NELSON: So they go to all of the
24 work to apply, and then they don't use the money.
25 GUY DANSIE: And it infuriates the grants

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1 subcommittee.

2 LAUARA SNYDER: Sometimes what happens,

3 too, is they apply and they get approved and then

4 their city budgets are cut out from under them and

5 they can't afford to buy it.

6 GUY DANSIE: This is only in per capita

7 we're talking about.

8 We're not going to penalize anybody for

9 competitive. Because of the matching issues or

10 vendors sometimes change the price after it's

11 submitted.

12 LAUARA SNYDER: Okay.

13 REGINA NELSON: We had that on AED grant.

14 We got the match grant for AED, and we couldn't come

15 up with the other half of the match. So Tooele lost

16 out grant.

17 GUY DANSIE: Right.

18 LAUARA SNYDER: I agree. For per capita,

19 there's no excuse to not go --

20 GUY DANSIE: Right. This is under the per

21 capita heading -- well, per capita and competitive.

22 But the language in there says, "EMS grantees who do

23 not use at least 90 percent of the per capita grant

24 from the previous grant period may be penalized."

25 It's not a "shall." It's just saying that

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1 we may penalize them at 50 percent of their per

2 capita award for the following grant period.

3 That's so we're going to slap your hand

4 and say, "Next time you're not going to get as much

5 of an award until you" --

6 LAUARA SNYDER: But you're not going to

7 cut it off so much that it's less than \$500.

8 GUY DANSIE: Right. It will never go

9 below 500.

10 LAUARA SNYDER: I think that's appropriate

11 because --

12 JAY DEE DOWNS: How many don't? I'm just

13 curious.

14 GAY BROGDON: We had 300,000 left on the

15 table last year.

16 LAUARA SNYDER: Oh, wow.

17 JAY DEE DOWNS: Wow. How many agencies

18 was that though? Is that one great big one, or is

19 that a lot of small ones?

20 GAY BROGDON: There were 35 or 40 agencies

21 that were involved.

22 JAY DEE DOWNS: That didn't use their

23 grant money.

24 REGINA NELSON: Gay, Does that become

25 something that's utilized in the following fiscal

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1 year?

2 GAY BROGDON: Yes.

3 GUY DANSIE: Brittany said that we

4 couldn't do it this past year. Everybody was in

5 favor of personalizing them and then throwing the

6 money back in and then reallocating it da, da, da.

7 But Brittany says it wasn't clear and it wasn't fair.

8 So we put this language in the rule. So that

9 everybody understands it, and then we will do it the

10 next cycle.

11 JAY DEE DOWNS: The risk isn't really

12 there. The risk is the politicians look at it and

13 go, "Oh, they had \$300,000. They didn't use it, so

14 they must they must not need it."

15 GUY DANSIE: That's exactly the problem.

16 So why should we give them more money.

17 JAY DEE DOWNS: And it's so minute anyway.

18 That's the saddest part is it's 500,000 or whatever.

19 So half of it wasn't used.

20 Can I have more.

21 REGINA NELSON: I know. That's what I was

22 going to say. All of us that have used all of ours,

23 plus some. I always have a little over for Gay so

24 she can see that I need more. Like the military,

25 spend it all.

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1 JAY DEE DOWNS: Whatever happened to when

2 they were going to like gather it back up in May and

3 then reissue it real quick? Remember the discussion

4 on that, on the per capita?

5 GAY BROGDON: They decided they couldn't

6 do it because the way the State has to enter

7 contracts. They have to issue new contracts for you

8 to sign. You'd have to sign them. All of that

9 process that we're still --

10 JAY DEE DOWNS: Trying to gather up.

11 GAY BROGDON: Yeah.

12 JAY DEE DOWNS: I'm in compliance now.

13 GAY BROGDON: There you go. I've got

14 seven more to go.

15 JAY DEE DOWNS: Who?

16 GAY BROGDON: Actually South Salt Lake is

17 one of them.

18 THE REPORTER: I can't hear you.

19 JAY DEE DOWNS: I'm just asking if there

20 is somebody in my area that I can help her get the

21 contracts for.

22 GAY BROGDON: You can go back to my desk

23 and see.

24 JAY DEE DOWNS: Or just let me know.

25 GAY BROGDON: Okay.

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1 GUY DANSIE: So any other things? Are we
2 good?
3 And I know you guys are not probably super
4 happy about the 911-only thing.
5 LAUARA SNYDER: Huh-uh (negative). I'm
6 not.
7 GUY DANSIE: And I would say --
8 LAUARA SNYDER: On the record of course,
9 I'm not.
10 GUY DANSIE: Let's look at the statute and
11 maybe we can push -- I really feel like if the
12 department opens and wants to pursue that, that we
13 need to have an open discussion with everybody.
14 LAUARA SNYDER: I agree. Because I think
15 that we're wasting time putting a Band-Aid on a rule
16 when it's the statute that needs fixed.
17 GUY DANSIE: I agree. I agree.
18 LAUARA SNYDER: And we're going to spend a
19 lots time in committees and arguments and whatever to
20 fix something that really --
21 JAY DEE DOWNS: We can't fix.
22 LAUARA SNYDER: -- we can't fix. We can't
23 fix it here. We can't fix the problem here.
24 GUY DANSIE: I agree. And maybe the rule
25 will be the catalyst to that discussion to change the

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1 statute.
2 LAUARA SNYDER: Well, maybe if we just not
3 do anything with it, it will make everybody want to
4 hurry up and fix the statute.
5 GUY DANSIE: Maybe we could do that, but
6 that's not what my bosses have told me. So I had to
7 come up with some language. So we can debate it at
8 the committee meeting again, at the EMS committee.
9 I'm sure there will be a debate.
10 LAUARA SNYDER: Oh, I'm sure there will be
11 a debate.
12 GUY DANSIE: Great. This is a can of
13 worms that we don't want to be opened. We've had a
14 situation with our statute that's been kind of
15 problematic for probably 15, 20 years, I would say.
16 For at least as long as I've been involved with the
17 EMS, and I think it needs to be clarified.
18 Okay. Are we good?
19 REGINA NELSON: Yeah, when is the EMS
20 meeting?
21 GAY BROGDON: October 18th.
22 GUY DANSIE: At 1:00 here.
23 JAY DEE DOWNS: I can't be there. I don't
24 want to go over this argument. We've already had it.
25 GUY DANSIE: It keeps the attendance up.

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1 It's great.
2 LAUARA SNYDER: We need to go and at least
3 to talk about this grants thing we've discussed here.
4 JAY DEE DOWNS: It's part of my agenda.
5 GUY DANSIE: The other thing we need to
6 decide probably as a group is we're coming on the new
7 year, and we have like one more meeting before
8 January, right? December. Do we want to look at
9 dates for that?
10 LAUARA SNYDER: Do you think there will be
11 anything for us to discuss? I don't think we will
12 have anything on the agenda.
13 GUY DANSIE: I doubt there will be. Do
14 you want to just wait until the end of the new year?
15 The other issue I think is we have a
16 committee that's kind of getting a little bit soft on
17 attendance. Do we want to reopen membership and look
18 at new membership?
19 LAUARA SNYDER: Yeah. A little new blood
20 won't hurt anything. If people that have -- if
21 they're on this and they haven't come to the last
22 year.
23 GUY DANSIE: Right. And I haven't
24 actually formally kicked them off or dismissed them.
25 Because I think it was last year that everybody said

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1 they wanted to re-up. But if they don't, let's ask
2 again. And if not we'll put new members on it and
3 get new blood in here.
4 LAUARA SNYDER: I think so.
5 GUY DANSIE: Okay. Because January is
6 when we started it, and I assume that that's probably
7 the best time to freshen up the positions if we
8 need the --
9 GAY BROGDON: So if we don't have one
10 before January, do we want to look at a meeting in
11 January and March? What are we thinking?
12 GUY DANSIE: Well, I don't anticipate any
13 -- we're going to roll all of the rules out that have
14 all of these certification/license things. And then
15 all of the certification rules or the licensure --
16 the individual rules and all of their -- all of this
17 is going to be made effective by probably about the
18 end of the new year -- or the end of this year, the
19 start of the new year.
20 LAUARA SNYDER: So when does all of this
21 stuff go out to public comment?
22 GUY DANSIE: After the committee meeting
23 it can go out.
24 JAY DEE DOWNS: And how long is it out
25 for? 45 days?

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1 GUY DANSIE: 30. It takes me maybe a week
2 to get it ready and approved internally. It has to
3 have Brittany's on it. It has to have Paul, Dean,
4 and then Dr. Minor, the executive director. They
5 have to bless it. Then it goes out to comment. I
6 have to do the fiscal impacts, and there's a new
7 requirements for that. So I don't know how much work
8 that's going to be. But there will be fiscal impacts
9 on grants.
10 JAY DEE DOWNS: Maybe what we ought to do
11 is keep it loose. And if there's a need to meet in
12 December, we just call a meeting. If there's not, we
13 don't worry about it.
14 GUY DANSIE: Yeah. That's what I think.
15 JAY DEE DOWNS: If that's okay with you
16 guys. And then we, I think also, shoot an e-mail to
17 those guys who haven't been here in the last three or
18 four times and say, "Hey, we noticed you haven't been
19 here. We just want to know do you want to be on the
20 committee or not? Your attendance is needed."
21 GUY DANSIE: Right.
22 LAUARA SYNDER: Your attendance is crap.
23 JAY DEE DOWNS: "Your attendance is
24 needed. If not, let us know so we can fill your
25 spot."

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1 GUY DANSIE: Yeah. And I'm with Lauara,
2 I like to have new blood. I think it's always good
3 to --
4 JAY DEE DOWNS: A different set of eyes.
5 GUY DANSIE: Yeah. Well, we need to train
6 some of -- kind of train how to participate for some
7 of the younger people or people that haven't been
8 involved.
9 LAUARA SNYDER: Maybe we should stay home
10 while they're training.
11 GUY DANSIE: No. What I'm saying is we
12 have familiar faces that pretty much run all of our
13 committee and subcommittees over and over and over.
14 And it's good to bring in new people. Because a lot
15 of them are getting old or leaving or whatever, and
16 we're losing leadership. And we need to develop new
17 leadership.
18 LAUARA SNYDER: It's just about me. Oh, I
19 should give you a fair warning.
20 GUY DANSIE: Are we done then?
21 Officially adjourned?
22 JAY DEE DOWNS: We're off the record.
