

APPLICATION FOR PERMISSION TO PLACE DEVICE AT BEAR LAKE



The bed of Bear Lake is state sovereign land, administered by the Utah Division of Forestry, Fire and State Lands (FFSL). In addition, the Utah Division of State Parks and Recreation has requirements to ensure navigational safety at Bear Lake. All devices placed at Bear Lake must have the approval of State Parks as well as a valid permit from FFSL. This application and the fees described herein are required in order to begin the approval process.

Please complete and submit to the Bear Lake State Park Marina at least 60 days prior to anticipated placement.

APPENDIX A: REQUIREMENTS FOR BUOYS AND DOCKS ON BEAR LAKE



This appendix is intended to provide a general description of requirements for various devices placed at Bear Lake and other boating waters in Utah. These requirements are not unique to Bear Lake, but are based on national standards established by the United States Coast Guard (USCG) Aids to Navigation System (ATONS)

MOORING BUOYS:



Mooring buoys are used to anchor/moor boats and/or floating docks. In compliance with national standards, mooring buoys shall be white, circular or cylindrical, and have a 2 inch, blue horizontal stripe.

All buoys must be identified with the last name of the applicant in 1 inch high (minimum) letters, visible above the water surface.

Any boat that is anchored/moored on the lake between sunset and sunrise shall display the boat's white, 360 degree anchor light.

REGULATORY MARKERS:



"Slow", "Wakeless Speed," "Boats Keep Out," "Swim Area," "Danger/Hazard" or other informational buoys and regulatory markers must meet United States Coast Guard (USCG) ATON standards.

Regulatory Markers and informational buoys must be a cylindrical "can" style with a minimum 9 inch diameter.

All regulatory markers must be identified with the last name of the applicant in 1 inch high letters visible on the buoy.

FLOATING DOCKS/SWIM PLATFORMS:



Floating Docks and Wheeled Piers attached to the shoreline must be located as near as possible to the center of the adjacent upland parcel and extend into the water at approximately a 90 degree angle to the shoreline.



Floating Docks and Wheeled Piers attached to shore and extending 75 feet or more into water shall display a white, 360 degree flashing light, approximately 1 meter above the surface of the water that meets USCG ATON standards.



Floating docks and/or swim platforms that are not attached to the shoreline and anchored or moored on the lake between sunset and sunrise shall also display a white, 360 degree flashing light, approximately 1 meter above the surface of the water that meets USCG ATON standards.

All docks, platforms, and piers must be identified with the last name of the permittee and last three digits of the issued permit number in 3 inch tall (minimum) letters visible on the end or side of the dock facing away from the shoreline, so that it can be viewed from an approaching boat.



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
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
